

Twp. of Pickering

Employment grant \$30,000

PICKERING TWP. - An employment incentive program will be launched in Pickering Township shortly to make use of a \$1 per capita grant to municipalities which initiate such programs.

Although Pickering Township's population is 31,500, the grant is

based on the population that was used to make the per capita grant for 1970 - a little less than \$30,000.

Department heads have prepared a program which would include ditching, parks work, work at the arena, and painters to paint the municipal building. Welfare recipients and unemployed people would be selected and supervised by personnel skilled in their field. Pay for laborers would be \$2.85 per hour, and the program would last until the beginning of June.

Cutting of dead and dying elm trees was thought by Councillor Mrs. Jean McPherson to be one of the best suggestions, which is presently being carried out by the Department of Highways. She felt the people in all areas of

the township would benefit by this.

The reeve favored a tree-planting project in the subdivisions and Mrs. McPherson countered that all the work must not be done in one area.

Other suggestions for the program was the installation of a floral display at the police station, construction of bleachers at Moore Road, and park improvements, construction of tennis courts.

When arguments arose over supervision, the involvement of equipment, and the need of a co-ordinator (the township treasurer will keep strict account and phase out the program as the \$30,000 phases out), Councillor Don Kitchen said:

"Let's take the attitude of what we can do. Not what we can't do."
