Arena his 'second home'

STOUFFVILLE - When the key was turned in the front door of the Arena, April 17, Stouffville's Ed Grimshaw must have felt very much like the man who had just been 'evicted' from his home.

For as local convenor over five OMHA teams and the coach of one, the rink has been his 'second home' all winter long.

But, in spite of the long hours, the responsibilities and the problems involved, Ed is the first to admit he's enjoyed every minute of it.

Now 36, the handsome, good-natured guy knows both sides of the hockey story. As a player in the early '50's, he performed with the Weston 'Dukes' and Toronto 'Marlboros'.

Now, he's working with management where dollars and cents are important factors.

This winter, when all bills are paid, the Stouffville Minor Hockey Association

will have closed out a program costing in the neighborhood of \$15,000.

"It's no Mickey Mouse outfit anymore," he said, "it's big business".

Just how big, is pointed out by the fact his telephone bill, during peak playoff periods has been known to exceed \$68 a month. And that's for long-distance calls alone.

While scheduling of games is important, the convenor's job is also a public relation's post. And in this capacity, the organization has a number one man. Ed makes friends everywhere he goes, creating excellent goodwill for Stouffville teams and the Town.

"You meet a wonderful bunch of people," he said, "I've had excellent cooperation". Locally, he says everyone, from stick-boys through to the Arena Board have assisted him greatly.

But Ed has returned the favors ten-fold.

For instance, he drove 225 miles to Sarnia, the day before the Peeewe's Saturday game in Petrolia, arranged motel accommodation for the club, parents and fans, stayed to see one game, drove back to Stouffville and convened a Bantam tournament in the arena on Sunday.

When the Petrolia team came here, he set them up in a motel, arranged for the players to meet personally with members of the Boston Bruins in Toronto and reserved accommodation for the ladies at a fashion show at Eaton's.

Because of this, Stouffville's stock in the eyes of Petrolia fans, rose 100 percent.

But why does he do it?

Not even Ed himself has the answer - other than he loves hockey and likes the people associated with it.

The fact is, he doesn't have a boy in the game. His family of three are all girls, Nori, 17, Connie, 14 and Terri, 11. He also has a very patient and understanding wife.
