

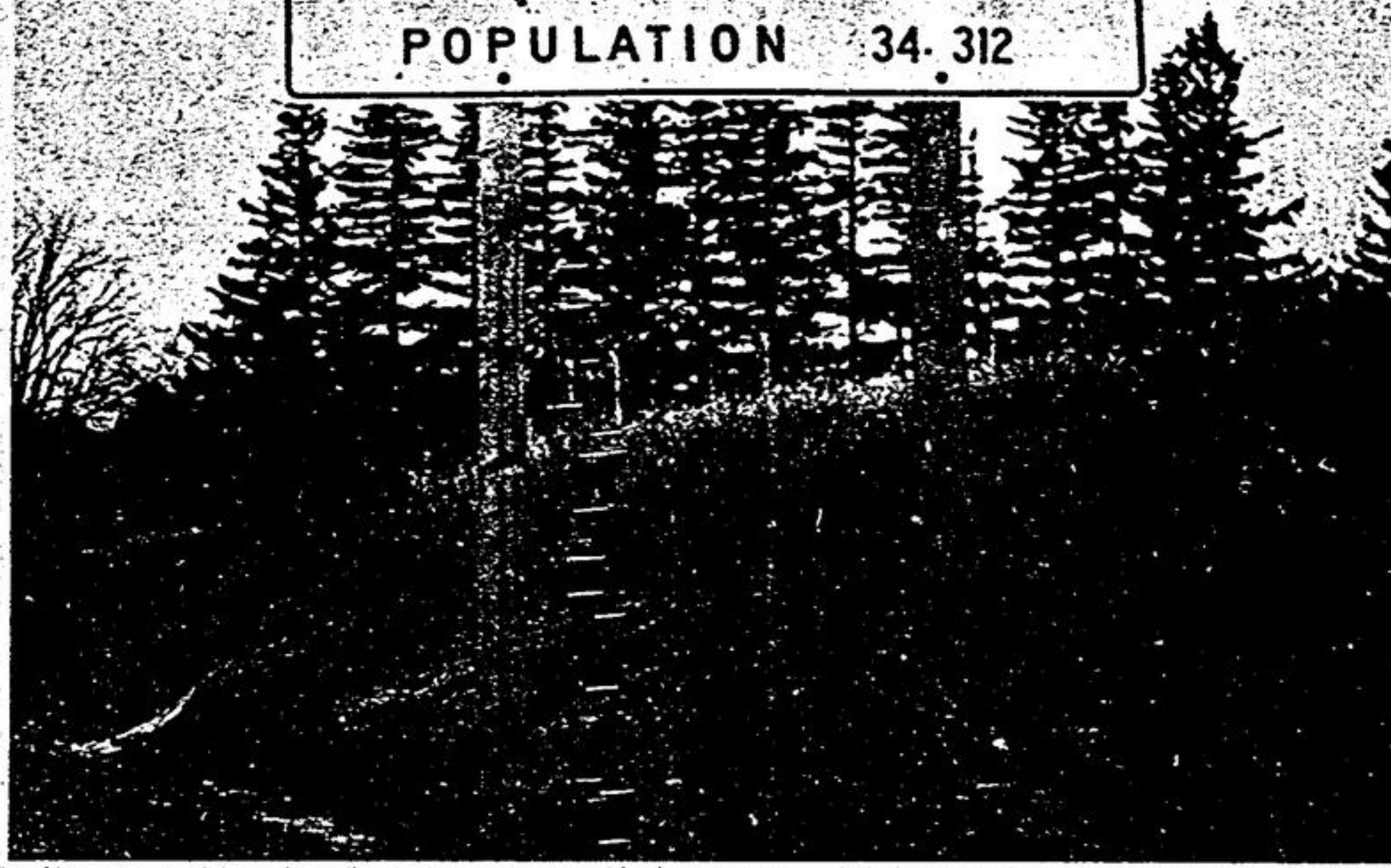
Feathered 'mail thieves' on Gormley rural routes
