

Uxbridge garbage controls

Opposition voiced by operators

GOODWOOD - Appearing before Uxbridge Township Council and Ontario Government representatives, Messrs. Beech and Pederson, operators of two dumping areas in the township, claimed that new government regulations calling for all refuse to be buried rather than burned, were impractical. The dumps are presently handling the garbage from Stouffville and Uxbridge Town. Mr. Stuart Campbell and Dr. Watkins from the Dept. of Energy and Resources advised that operators had been told of the change last fall and the new Act calling for fill instead of burn, came into force in March this year. The permit held by Mr. Beech expires this July while the Pederson dump is already operating without licence.

Councillor Hendy said that an application to build an incinerator had been refused by the department but representatives claimed no knowledge of this action.

Mr. Beech said that the idea of digging six-foot holes and then covering them immediately wouldn't work when you could have as many as fourteen trucks there at one time. He added that the Department had no knowledge of the winter conditions.

John Roberts M. P. Elections cost money

YORK-SIMCOE - Last month, the York-Simcoe Liberal Association held a fund-raising dinner in Aurora.

The guest speaker was Hon. Joe Greene, Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources. The ticket price was \$25 per person, of which about half goes to cover the cost of the banquet.

In commenting on the event, John Roberts, M.P. is hopeful everyone who attended had a pleasant time. However, he admits, several have been critical, claiming the fee was such that only a 'privileged group could afford to be present.

Questions posed were: How can the Association organize meetings open only to the well-to-do? Does this not betray the so-called principles of participation?

Mr. Roberts suggests such argument confuses two things: the question of participation and the problem of fund raising.

He feels the York-Simcoe Association has done much to encourage greater citizen involvement. He also suggests that through speaking engagements, questionnaires, newsletters, a weekly column and regular office hours, he personally has endeavored to keep in close touch with the people.

"We really have tried to make the Liberal Party in York-Simcoe open to everyone who is interested," he says.

However, Mr. Roberts points out, activity of this kind does not raise election funds.

For example, his 1968 election campaign cost close to \$16,000. His Conservative opponent spent almost twice that much and the N.D.P. candidate, considerably less.

About one-quarter of the \$16,000 was met by the funds of the Liberal Party of Canada, leaving about \$12,000 to be raised through other means. One such means, says Mr. Roberts, is a gathering like the 'Joe Greene dinner'.

The York-Simcoe Member feels we have reached the state where election expenses of political parties should be recognized as for the public good and should be supported by the public treasury.

The highest amount spent in 1968 by a federal candidate was approximately \$70,000.
