Although Planning Committee is not prepared to consider proposals for estate-type development until the consolidation bylaw is finalized, plans keep pouring in.

The latest proposal introduced May 6, calls for the development of the former Hartwick farm, conc. 6.

Developers seek to divide the property into 23, two-acre lots.

Representing Furgg Investments, Harry Di Paola told the Committee he felt the property was 'ideal' for estate-type build-up. He described the location as 'extremely picturesque' and suggested the proposed community of homes would be in line with the provisions of the Official Plan.

"We know we have to wait our turn, but we feel the property merits consideration", he said.

The plan was received and deferred for further consideration.
