STOUFFVILLE - The Stouffville Community Swimming Pool will open for the summer at 2:00 p.m., Saturday, June 5.

As part of Water Safety Week across Ontario, June 5 to June 12, the staff of the pool will be running a survival swimming program. The course will teach and promote self survival and general water safety.

All interested students, holding at least a Junior Red Cross Award should be at the pool between 7:00 and 7:30 p.m., Monday, June 7. All

interested adults should be at the pool between 7:00 and 7:30 p.m., Wednesday, June 9.

The cost for the course will be 50 cents per person. Each individual is requested to bring a lifejacket for the classes although additional jackets will be available at the pool.

During the month of June, the pool will open Monday through Friday, 4:00 - 6:00 p.m., 7:00 - 9:00 p.m., Saturday 10:00 - 12:00 noon, 2:00 - 5:00 p.m., and 7:00 - 9:00 p.m., and Sunday 1:00 - 5:00 p.m.

Ballantrae start fizzles out

STOUFFVILLE - It was an encouraging start as Wayne Jackson slugged a two-base hit to start Ballantrae off against Stouffville, Thursday night in fastball action.

Jackson then stole third and was driven home by Eric Barber's single. However, Ballantrae was unable to score another run until the seventh inning, and they went down to defeat by the home team, 8 - 5.

After a weak first inning, Stouffville tallied two in the second, with five hits off Ballantrae pitcher Bob Lee. The runs were Wayne Crowder and Dave Connell driven in by Jim Moore.

Brian Emery picked up his first homer of the year off a smash that got past Ballantrae's first

baseball, Jack Palmer, and went down to right field, giving Stouffville a 3 - 1 lead in the third. They widened the gap in the fifth with four more runs off substitute Ballantrae hurler, Jim Lee. Five bases were stolen in that inning, including home by Emery. Runs were also scored by Wayne Crowder, who batted in Pete Sanderson, and by heavy hitter Gord Tarr, who drove in Crowder with a home run. It was a close one though, with the ball arriving at home from centre field, just after Tarr was declared safe.

The sixth saw Crowder send a fly down to right-fielder Rick Stephenson, who trapped it then sent it to the infield to tag Emery attempting to steal home again.

In the next inning, Stouffville's mound manager, Gord Tarr, walked Joe Barber. Then, on an error by Stouffville, Barber stole both second and third. Another error, by catcher Wayne Crowder, gave Barber time to slide his way home to give Ballantrae their second point.

The top of the eighth looked promising for Ballantrae as Jack Palmer sank one into left field and sprinted to second, the first two-base effort for Ballantrae since the first batter of the game. After Jackson singled, Barber drove in Palmer. Jackson then stole home for

The announcement took the Markham pharmacist totally by surprise. He told The Tribune, "I guess the

first I heard of it was when I read it in the paper." He had no expectations of receiving this honor, which was the second he has received in many weeks. Toronto Mayor, William Dennison, just bestowed on him the Civic Award of Merit.

Once recognized as the world's leading half-miler, Crothers track record includes being a silver medalist at the 1964 Tokyo Olympics.

At the 1966 Empire Games in Jamaica and the 1967 Pan-Am games in Winnipeg, he also received a silver medal.

Crothers has been active in the Canadian Track and Field Association, since his

VANDORF - While recreation programs in the more rural regions, Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville, appear well organized, at least for the summer season, there are rumblings of discontent within the Area's main urban centre - the former Village of Stouffville.

And according to several, present at a public meeting in Vandorf, Monday, there's little chance of improvement without the assistance of a hired co-ordinator, an individual who can weld the groups together into a single operative unit.

However, Mayor Ken Laushway is not optimistic that such a person can be found so late in the season. He feels the Recreation Commission was lax in not making a move in this direction earlier.


He also feels that the public meeting held May 31 should have been called a month ago to acquaint the people with programs proposed for the holiday period and how provincial grants on expenditures could be obtained.

But on one aspect of the Mayor's remarks, John Foulds of Stouffville disagreed. He argued that it was not too late to acquire the services of a recreation co-ordinator if the Commission acted immediately. He even went so far as to suggest that the necessary funds could very likely be obtained to cover the cost.

Later, Mayor Laushway said that his main fear was that recreation expenditures might soar out of sight and pose a financial burden on the taxpayer - many of whom were not particularly interested in such programs. He said such a problem had occurred in some municipalities adjacent to Town. He argued that he still favored the volunteer system, rather than persons receiving pay for services of this kind.

While programs in fastball and tennis are now going strong, the best organized activity in numbers comes under the direction of Stouffville's Nancy Murphy and Marcia Wagg. The two girls will operate a supervised playground school from 12 noon to 2 p.m., for 7 to 11 year olds and 2 to 4 p.m., for children, 4 to 6. The fee for the season is \$8 per child with special family rates. An attendance of up to 125 boys and girls are expected.

A second public meeting is set for Monday, June 14, at which time the budget prospects will be more clearly outlined.
