Fuller.


Stouffville's mark of

## One Holstein - \$65,000

## Records set at sale of Romandale Farm herd

UNIONVILLE  
Stephen B. Roman,  
Canada's uranium  
king, sold his  
internationally famous  
Romandale herd of  
Holstein cattle at the  
farm near Unionville,  
May 24. A world  
record price for a cow  
of \$65,000 was  
established and the  
herd brought a total of  
\$672,600 for 178 head to  
set a new Canadian  
record average for a  
cattle dispersal sale of  
\$3,779 each. Sixty head  
were offered in pairs  
with the buyer taking  
his choice and the  
other animal remaining  
at Romandale where  
the 30 head will form the  
nucleus for a new herd.

The world record  
price for a cow of  
\$65,000 was paid by  
Claude F. Picket,  
Georgetown, for the  
'Very Good' two-year-  
old heifer, Romandale  
Reflection Cristy. Her  
full brother, the 21  
months old Romandale  
Uranium Atom, brought  
\$52,000 on the  
joint bid of United  
Breeders Inc. and  
Universal Breeding  
Services of Guelph, the  
former a leading ar-

tificial breeding stud  
and the latter a syndicate  
of breeders.

The former world  
record price for a cow  
was \$62,000 paid by  
E.L. Vesely, Lapeer,  
Mich., to R.R. Dennis,  
Oak Ridges, Ontario,  
in 1968 for the All-  
Canadian Aged Cow,  
Oak Ridges Royal  
Linda.

The eight-year-old  
Excellent cow, Romandale  
Maxime, went to Raymond  
Edwards, Indiana,  
Pa., at \$30,000 and her  
three-months-old son,  
Romandale Book-  
maker, by Paclamar  
Bootmaker, also  
brought \$30,000 going  
to Universal Breeding  
Services, Guelph.

Runner-up for the  
\$65,000 cow was Mr.  
and Mrs. K. Showering,  
Wells, England. They bought  
13 head including a  
'Very Good' four-year-  
old heifer at \$26,000  
and an 'excellent' five  
year-old at \$25,000.  
They also secured bred  
heifers at \$9,300, \$7,300  
and \$7,000 each and  
heifer calves up to  
\$6,000. 117 head were sold

for export, going to  
U.S.A., Mexico, Puerto  
Rico, Brazil, England,  
Italy and Japan.  
Seven Brazilian  
buyers took 49 head  
with a top of \$3,200, 6  
went to Japan at prices  
up to \$6,100 and  
Ganado Y. Equipos of  
Mexico paid \$13,000 for  
a bred heifer.

Peixoto R., Sao Paulo,  
securing 19 animals.  
A. Ladina, Cremona,  
Italy, bought 12 head  
with a top of \$3,200, 6  
went to Japan at prices  
up to \$6,100 and  
Ganado Y. Equipos of  
Mexico paid \$13,000 for  
a bred heifer.

Tom Hays of Hays  
Farms International,

Sixteen bulls  
averaged \$7,296.78

milking females  
\$4,377; 41 bred heifers  
\$2,869; 14 open  
yearlings \$1,636 and 29  
heifer calves \$1,771.
