

Approve beer festival

STOUFFVILLE - A beer festival in Stouffville? Yes, said Town Council, at a meeting, Tuesday.

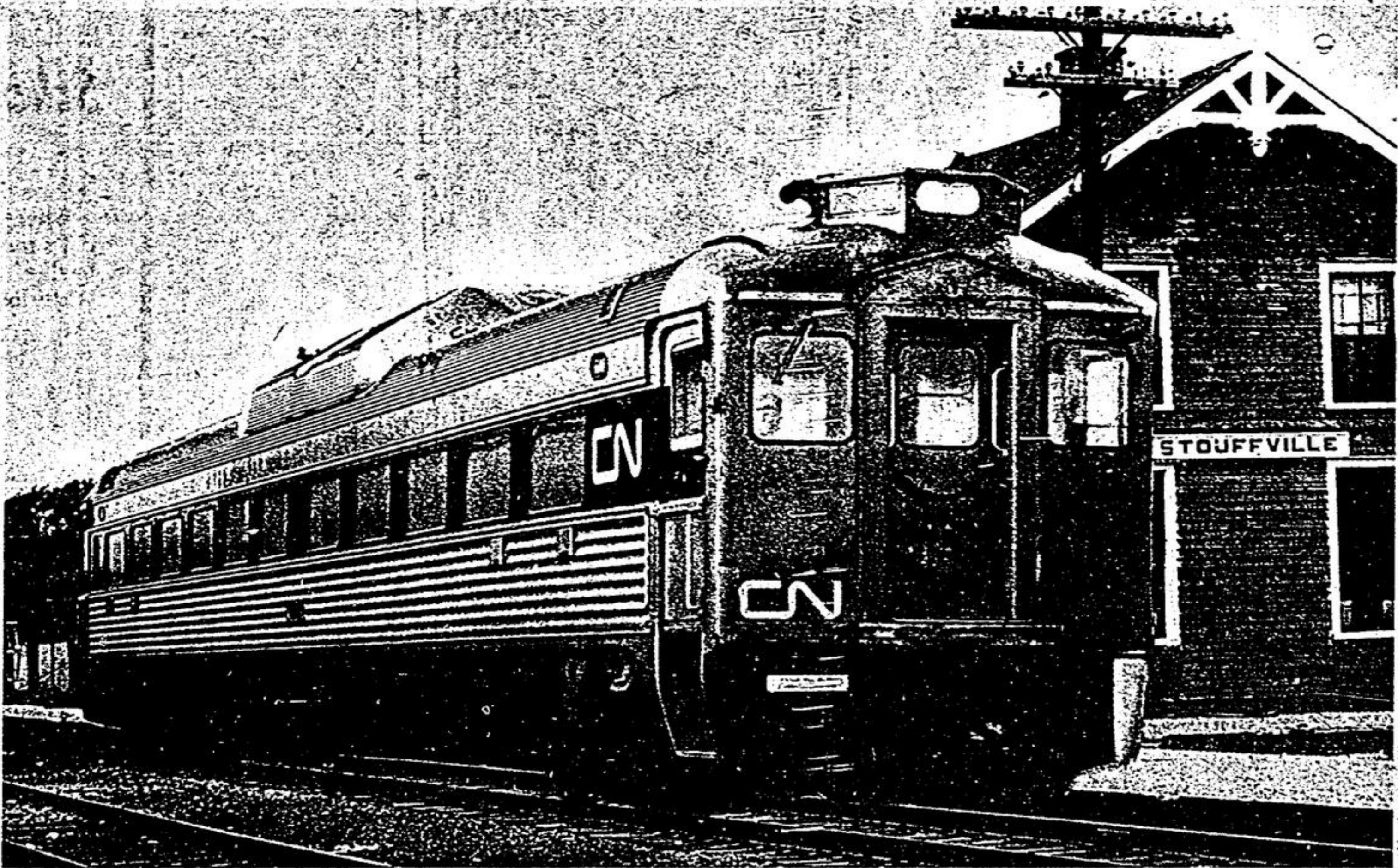
The proposed location is the Stouffville Arena. The tentative date is August 14.

The event, similar to the one held in Markham, recently, will be sponsored by the Fire Department, with all proceeds for the Muscular Dystrophy Association.

The application, announced by Mayor Ken Laushway, won unanimous approval.

"Such affairs are becoming quite common," said Mr. Laushway, "all our neighbors are having them."

All organizational work will be done by the firemen. However, before a licence is granted, confirmation must come from the Liquor Control Board of Ontario.

Canadian National Commuter service begins here Monday

Leaves daily 7.05 a.m.

STOUFFVILLE - A new Canadian National commuter train service will commence operations from Toronto to Stouffville, next Monday, June 28. The unit, which will use dayliner-type equipment, will leave Stouffville each morning at 7:05 a.m., arriving in Toronto at 8:05 a.m. It will return to Stouffville each evening from Toronto at 5:20 p.m., arriving here at 6:20 p.m.

Civic reception

STOUFFVILLE - A civic reception will be accorded the arrival of C.N.'s rail commuter, at the Stouffville station, Monday evening.

The anticipated time is 6:20 p.m.

Plans for the ceremonial welcome are now underway, Mayor Ken Laushway said. He expressed the hope that as many residents as possible would endeavor to attend.

The extended service was announced this week by S.E. Spencer, manager of CN's Toronto area. Canadian National has been operating an evening-only rail service as far as Markham for several years. The service which will not operate on Saturdays, Sundays or holidays, will make stops at Markham, Unionville, Milliken and Agincourt and a schedule of the times and rates appears elsewhere in this newspaper.

Canadian National Railway met with Mayor Ken Laushway and council to discuss the arrangements for the new commuter rail service and its future potential.

One-way fares are as follows: Agincourt 65 cents; Milliken, 80 cents; Unionville, 95 cents; Markham, \$1.15; and Stouffville, \$1.45. Ten ride tickets will also be available. Initially, tickets may be purchased at CN stations on the route or cash fares paid to conductors. However, ticketing procedures are being studied and a simplified method is being worked out.

Mayor Laushway said there were over 400 persons leaving Stouffville each day for jobs in the city. He fully concurred with the railway that the new service would stimulate development.

Questioned regarding the future of the present C.N.R. depot, railway representatives said no major changes were anticipated.

Mayor Laushway said the community and council were enthused over the new service and every effort would be made to encourage it's use.

Veneral disease

Case increases difficult to assess

STOUFFVILLE - A pamphlet entitled 'Facts About Veneral Disease' has been sent out by District 11 of the Ontario Secondary School Teacher's Association to all known organizations in the County of York.

The program is, in the words of Ralph Magel, Public Relations Officer, established to make the public more aware of the epidemic we face.

Mr. Magel's letter is published on Page 2 of this issue.

Is the term 'epidemic' an over-exaggeration?

In the United States, the number of persons infected is

estimated at 2,500,000. In Ontario, the estimate is one in seventy-five or about 100,000 persons.

Have any veneral disease cases been reported in Stouffville? Yes, physicians confirm, but not in numbers to cause serious concern.

Dr. Glenn Graham told The Tribune that VD being the kind of disease it is, tends to prompt carriers to seek medical treatment from a doctor other than their regular family physician. This conclusion was supported by Dr. Douglas Brodie, Uxbridge kids come to Stouffville and Stouffville kids go to Markham or Uxbridge," he said. Dr. Graham noted that as the community grows in numbers, the number of cases would also increase.

In the published pamphlet, Dr. George C. Thosteson states, "A frightful epidemic of veneral disease is raging and getting worse day by day. And it will continue to get worse."

Rescue bid fails

MUSSELMAN'S LAKE - A heroic rescue bid by a Churchill Drive resident proved unsuccessful, Sunday, at the scene of a double drowning near the south shore of Musselman's Lake.

Brothers Dennis and Stanley McEwen, Pritchard Avenue, Toronto, were pronounced dead on arrival at York County Hospital, Newmarket.

Mrs. Jay Horton earned the praise of eye-witnesses as she dove three times into about 12 feet of water in search of the second victim. She has both St. John Ambulance and Red Cross lifesaving instruction. When she located the body, a man nearby assisted in carrying him ashore.

"I thought there was a chance," she said. She assisted Vance ambulance operators and police in providing artificial resuscitation and also aided the wife of the deceased, a witness to the tragedy.

To improve hydro service

STOUFFVILLE - If your television picture suddenly fades in the middle of a show or the oven cools while preparing dinner, don't blame it on the set or the stove.

It's called 'voltage fluctuation', a problem experienced mainly at the ends of lines.

A corrective program is now underway, P.U.C. Superintendent, Gordon Brown told The Tribune.

When finalized, Mr. Brown said, the service will be much improved. However, some power interruptions will occur, he explained, but shutoff period will be kept to a minimum.

Family life education course a parent-student proposal

YORK REGION - A delegation appeared Thursday, before the York Regional Board of Education and submitted a brief on 'Family Life Education.'

Members, all from Richmond Hill, urged the Board to in-

roduce the program in all public schools within their area. Mrs. Pat Bedford, spokesman for the delegation, suggested a need for such a program to fill a 'vacuum in relationships.'

Mrs. Bedford admitted to representing only the Richmond Hill, district, but expressed the hope that other groups in York Region would lend support. While her committee has not outlined a program, she said, they would be glad to work with the Board in organizing a curriculum.

Some trustees expressed concern about introducing 'Family Life Education' on a regional basis.

"What about having a program in a school where the local community is opposed?"

Trapped under car

STOUFFVILLE - The first persons to arrive at the scene of a single-car accident, around 3:30 a.m., June 16, felt certain a passenger in the vehicle was dead until a hand, protruding from under the roof, began to move.

Reinhardt Muehl was later pulled free after two tow trucks, employed by Wilson Motors, Stouffville, were required to raise the auto.

He suffered two broken legs and facial injuries.

The crash occurred on a County Road curve, east of the Markham-Pickering townline. The car, eastbound towards Clarendon, struck a section of loose gravel and overturned.

Muehl was thrown through the windshield.

The first officer at the scene said one youth was attempting to lift the auto with an ordinary car jack. "A slip, one way or another and the boy would have been crushed," he said. He was pinned there about thirty minutes.

Markham strike ends

MARKHAM - More money for less work.

This is the end result of a 3-week strike involving 89 employees in the Town of Markham.

The walk-out ended Thursday. The new agreement calls for a 40-hour week for outside workers rather than the previous 45.

A general increase of ten cents an hour becomes effective, Jan. 1, 1972 with an identical wage hike Jan. 1, 1973.

More money-less work

The increase for inside employees amounts to a flat \$500 this year; \$400 in '72 and \$200 in 1973.

In addition, the Town will increase its payments for health and welfare programs to three-quarters rather than two-thirds as at present.

The contract extends over a period of 30 months.

Packed!

GORMLEY - The accommodation at Bruce's Mill Conservation Area was taxed to the limit Sunday, as an estimated 7,380 persons 'poured' into the park.

The car count totalled 1,640. So great was the influx of visitors, the gates had to be closed by 1:15 p.m.

"It was an unusual day," said an M.T.R.C.A. spokesman, "instead of coming and going, the people came and stayed."

Cleanup campaign

STOUFFVILLE - A Town bylaw, that forbids the dumping of refuse on private lots or the maintaining of lots containing refuse, has been passed by Council. It is effective immediately.

Mayor Ken Laushway said that, in his opinion, the matter had received adequate publicity since its introduction, April 7.

York Police Commission Battle lines drawn

YORK REGION - The battle lines have been drawn and the fight is about to begin.

On the one side, the York Regional Police Commission. On the other, the York Regional Police Association.

The Association charges as illegal, the demotion of staff sergeants and sergeants to the ranks of acting patrol sergeants, when it assumed control earlier this year. It also opposes the inclusion of written examinations to determine promotions.

At a meeting Monday, the Commission re-affirmed its stand and promotional procedures are their responsibility.

The Association has applied to the Supreme Court of Ontario for an injunction barring written tests. It has also requested the Attorney-General of Ontario to appoint an arbitrator.

The Commission, however, feels that arbitration is not necessary and has instructed its solicitor to oppose this request as well as contest the proposed injunction.

According to figures released Monday, 31 sergeants and 33 constables have applied to write the promotion exams.

A meeting between the Association and the Commission, scheduled for this week, has been cancelled.
