Gormley pastor retires - 40 years in ministry

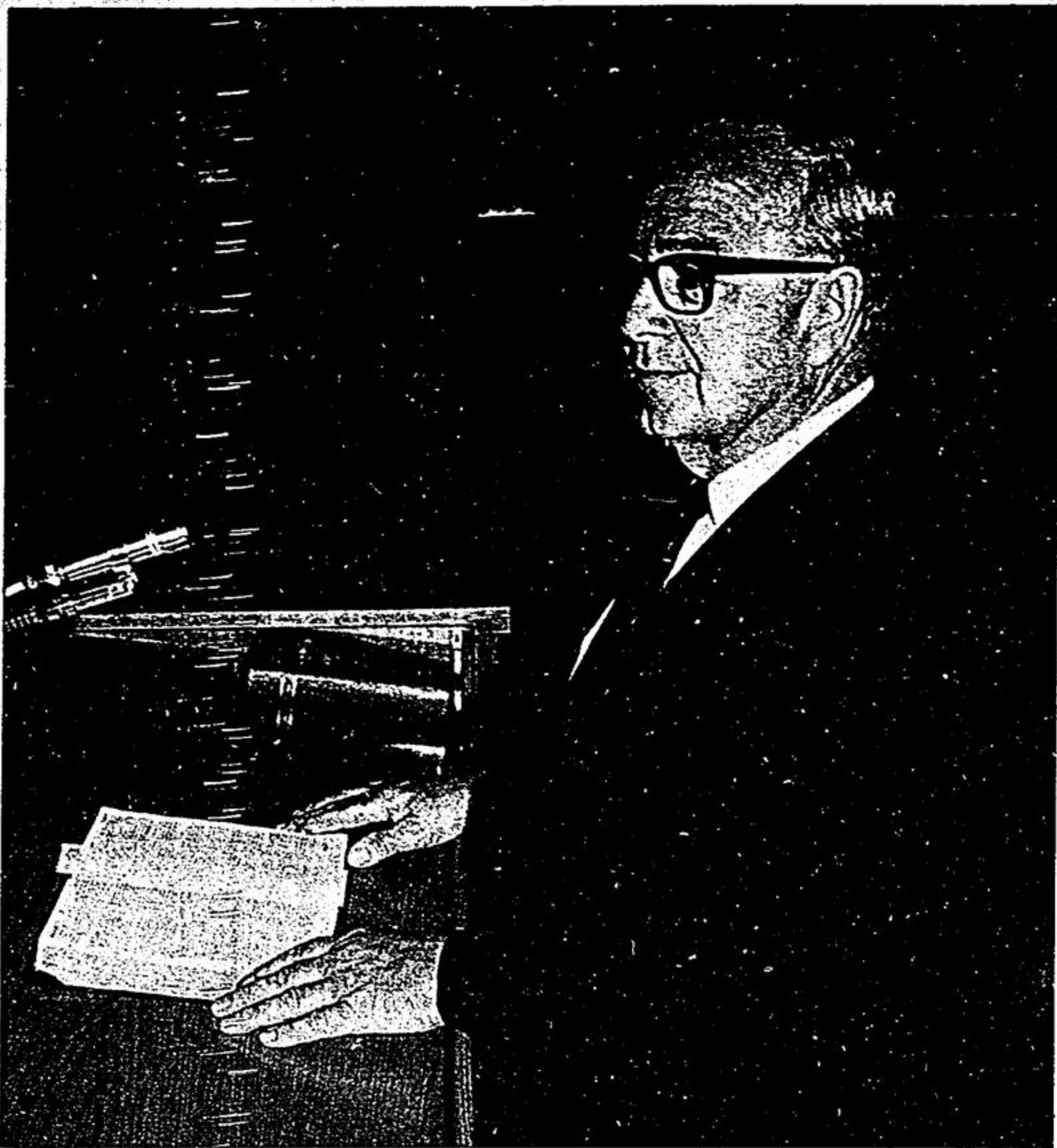

Half of accidents involved alcohol

ONTARIO SOUTH - Last year, 1,535 persons were killed in motor vehicle accidents in Ontario.

This figure, provided by the Dept. of Transport through Wm. Newman, M.P.P., Ontario South, shows a decrease of 8.8 percent from 1969. In those cases where drivers were killed, 49.5 percent of the 563 victims had been either drinking or were impaired. During the first nine months, 4,376 motorists whose blood alcohol level was at .08 or more, had their licences suspended. Licences of 468 drivers were suspended because of refusal to provide a breath sample where impairment was suspected. The lowest per capita death rate occurred in York, Niagara North, Centre, and Wentworth Counties. Motorcycle driver fatalities and injuries have shown a consistent decrease, attributed to a law that makes safety helmets mandatory.

The Expropriations Act, 1968-69

ONTARIO

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL TO DEPARTMENT OF EXPROPRIATE LAND TRANSPORTATION COMMUNICATIONS

IN THE MATTER of an application by the Minister of Transportation and Communications, for approval to expropriate lands in the Town of Whitechurch-Stouffville, Regional Municipality of York, formerly in the Village of Stouffville, County of York, for the purpose of acquiring sufficient land for the widening and reconstruction of Highway Number 47.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that application has been made for approval to expropriate the land described in the schedule hereto. Any owner of lands in respect of which notice is given who desires an inquiry into whether the taking of such land is fair, sound and reasonably necessary in the achievement of the objectives of the expropriating authority shall so notify the approving authority in writing.

(a) in the case of a registered owner, served personally or by registered mail within thirty days after he is served with the notice, or, when he is served by publication, within thirty days after the first publication of the notice;

(b) in the case of an owner who is not a registered owner, within thirty days after the first publication of the notice.

THE APPROVING AUTHORITY IS: Minister of Transportation & Communications, Parliament Buildings, Toronto 5, Ontario. Minister of Transportation & Communications, H. F. Gilbert, Superintendent of Properties.

NOTES:

1. The Expropriations Act, 1968-69 provides that, (a) where an inquiry is registered, it shall be conducted by an inquiry officer appointed by the Minister of Justice and Attorney General;

(b) the inquiry officer, (i) shall give every party to the inquiry an opportunity to present evidence and argument and to examine and cross-examine witnesses, either personally or by his counsel or agent, and (ii) may recommend to the approving authority that a party to the inquiry be paid a fixed amount for his costs of the inquiry not to exceed \$200 and the approving authority may in its discretion order the expropriating authority to pay such costs forthwith.

2. "owner" and "registered owner" are defined in the Act as follows: "owner" includes a mortgagee, tenant, execution creditor, a person entitled to a limited estate or interest in land, a committee of the estate of a mentally incompetent person or of a person incapable of managing his affairs, and a guardian, executor, administrator or trustee in whom land is vested; "registered owner" means an owner of land whose interest in the land is defined and whose name is specified in an instrument in the proper registry, land titles or sheriff's office, and includes a person shown as a tenant of land on the last revised assessment roll;

3. The expropriating authority, each owner who notifies the approving authority that he desires a hearing in respect of the lands intended to be expropriated and any owner added as a party by the inquiry officer are parties to the inquiry.

All right, title and interest in the following lands: In the Town of Whitechurch-Stouffville, Regional Municipality of York (formerly in the Village of Stouffville, County of York) Province of Ontario being part of: (A) Lot 35, Concession 10 of the Township of Markham (also known as part of Lot 7, Registered Plan Number 115 for the Village of Stouffville) County of York, designated as Part 8 on Department of Highways Plan P-5008-7, deposited as Number RS110, in the Registry Office for the Registry Division of Toronto Boroughs and York South.
