At Zion, he conducted the choir for a period of time and often sang solos on special occasions accompanied by Mrs. Robb at the organ. As choir master and organist this was a well known team in Toronto for a long time. Mr. Robb was a cheerful man with a Scottish twinkle in his eye and a happy approach to life. For this, as well as his generous contributions, he will be remembered. We extend sympathy to Mrs. Robb and family. The celebration of Cedar Grove Community Club's 25th anniversary is planned as an occasion to be enjoyed, not only by present Cedar Grovers, but by everyone who ever was a resident here. GOODWOOD - A joint meeting was held June 7, between the Uxbridge Council and that of Whitchurch-Stouffville. Waste disposal continued to be matter needing serious discussion. The general feeling of the two Councils was that both municipalities might soon have to establish their own facilities, and a joint effort is considered a possibility. Other comments centred around the problem of gravel pits and quarries. Copies of the resolution will be sent to the Minister of Mines, MPP Matthew Dymond, and MPP William Newman.
