Crime climb slows

 Criminal offenses in the Region are increasing more slowly than at this time last year.
 According to a report submitted by York Regional Police Chief Bruce Crawford, crime has increased over last year, but at a reduced rate. At the end of May, according to Chief Crawford, the increase was less than five percent.

Commission auction

YORK REGION
 York Regional Police will be holding an auction to dispose of unclaimed goods. At Monday's Police Commission meeting, Chief Bruce Crawford asked for approval of this measure.

Among the items held by the police are hunting rifles and shotguns, and almost 100 bicycles. A list submitted by Chief Crawford also names hi-fi equipment, a hookah pipe, floodlights, a vacuum cleaner, and what is described as "dwarf holding fish". These and other objects will be offered for sale.
 The Commission approved hiring of an auctioneer, and announcement of the time and place of auctions at a later date. It is tentatively planned to conduct these sales in Richmond Hill, Newmarket and Keswick.

Business destroyed by fire

GREENWOOD
 Gerry Fisher, whose service station and restaurant, 'The Paddock,' burned down about a month ago, was well supported when he appeared before the Pickering Township Committee of Adjustment, June 16. The township gallery was almost full of Greenwood and area residents, including John Cameron, who spoke on his behalf, and Maple Leaf hockey player, Bobby Baun.
 The residence of Mr. Fisher, not affected by the fire, and the demolished service station, are on Hwy. 7 near Greenwood.
 Application was to determine whether the bylaw permitted an agricultural service shop, not specifically mentioned in the clause.
 Besides the many people personally present in support of Mr. Fisher's application, a petition of over 100 names was submitted to the chairman, Gerald Allman.
 Mr. Fisher requires a building permit to rebuild, and without approval of the committee, it would have been denied. Approval was

granted, unanimously. When, noting the large number of people, Mr. Cameron, who lives just north of the 5th concession was asked if they expected trouble, he said no, but they just wanted to make sure the good service for the rural community of Mr. Fisher's shop would continue.
 "We would be very sorry to see any change in his status," he said, "and it would be like taking away his means of livelihood." Chairman Allman replied that Mr. Fisher was well known and respected in Claremont too.
 "I feel that this was an existing use before the bylaw was passed," said member A. D. Holmes. "It appears to me an ideal location for a gas station and agricultural service, and we are here to judge the thing on its specific merit."
 The application was okayed subject to Department of Highways approval regarding the entrance and exit.

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Plan new plaza

 At Thursday's meeting of the Markham Planning Committee, tentative approval was given for a new shopping centre.
 The centre, to be located north of No. 7 Highway at Wooten Way, is part of a development by Home Smith Properties.
 Townhouse construction will be considered separately as the developers hope to have the plaza completed before Christmas.

Following an earlier discussion of the Site Plan, Home Smith Properties submitted a revised plan to conform with the committee's requests.
 The committee recommended approval of the revised plan, subject to investigation by Mr. Kunio Hidaka, Markham's Planning Director.

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
