CLAREMONT Three years ago a group of local teenagers felt the need to do something worthwhile both for themselves and the community. From that feeling originated the Claremont Youth Club. At the Club's first meeting, Mike Hockley was elected president, a post which, with a record of good management and guidance, he still retains. Weekly meetings attract an average attendance of 35 persons. The members have learned the real meaning of belonging to an organization, how to cope with parliamentary procedure, and how to help and respect their fellow man. Each member, whether holding office or not, has done his part. They have undertaken many projects to raise money for various causes. The club has been especially active around Claremont's Community Hall. They have purchased light shades, painted, paid for part of a new turntable and public address system and purchased such items as a refrigerator and a coffee maker. Aside from these improvements, club members have helped with such events as Claremont's Fun Day where they ran the pie-eating contest and helped with children's events, also a Christmas project where they collected clothing and used toys for delivery to the Fred Victor Mission. For the public, club members have conducted monthly dances, shown full-length films, and have held euchre parties, open to everyone. The club's latest accomplishment was the adoption of a foster child in India.
