

How to use your library

By Doris Lapp STOUFFVILLE - The key word in any library is browse. In our small library it becomes a necessity. The constant reader will exhaust the supply if he always goes to the same section. There are other areas besides fiction. May we suggest parallel areas?

Popular topics are mystery and suspense. Of course, the first place to look is in our Mystery section, for the classic detective writers, such as Agatha Christie. We have a good selection but not inexhaustible. In sections 343-364, you will find books every bit as exciting, about actual crimes, eg: In Col'd Blood by Truman Capote. For another aspect of the mysterious, books on spiritualism and the occult, are shelved in the 133 section, eg: Cock Lane Ghost, by Douglas Grant.

For tales of adventure we recommend sections 940.1 to 940.54. These are true stories about the First and Second World Wars, eg: The Balloons, by Alan Morris. Try, also, travel books, 910-919, and the western novels which are in a permanent display. Don't forget biography, 920, for such books as Reach For the Sky, by Paul Brickhill.

Humorous books, also, may be found in several different sections. A biography, such as, Who Gets The Drumstick, by Helen Beardley, will raise a chuckle. The travel section has its share of laughs, as witness, The Boat That Wouldn't Float, by Farley Mowat. For the type of humor based on one man's view of life, look in 800-808.

Each year, this library receives a grant of books from the Central Ontario Regional Library. We have shelved 180 of these books recently. Most are adult non-fiction, ranging from sociology, 301, to sports, 796-799. You will recognize them by their shiny new plastic jackets.
