STOUFFVILLE - At its meeting July 13, Whitchurch - Stouffville Council voted to approve a half-dozen budget items totalling almost \$40,000.

Of this figure, the Museum Board accounted for \$6,000 and the Library Board for \$10,550. A figure of \$4,355 was allocated to the Recreation Committee. The largest single item was \$10,785 for the Stouffville Community Centre Board. Other Community Centre Boards - Ballantrae, \$3400, and Vandorf, \$4400, - completed the total.

Arrest two

VANDORF - A high-speed chase by police along Don Mills Road early Friday followed an alleged break-in at the Vandorf garage. Two men have been arrested as a result of the incident.

The Ontario Housing Corporation, at the request of your Municipal Council, is considering the development of senior citizen housing in the Town. To determine the local interest in this type of accommodation, survey questionnaires are now being distributed.

ONTARIO HOUSING CORPORATION
The Ontario Housing Corporation will conduct a survey to determine the need and demand for senior citizen housing in The Town of Markham.
A research team from OHC, the Ontario Government's housing agency, will estimate the number of senior citizens living in the community whose housing is inadequate or beyond their financial capabilities.
The demand in the area for housing on a rent-geared-to-income basis will be determined from information gathered through advertising, direct mail questionnaires and personal interviews.
The study, which begins shortly, was requested by the Municipal Council.
It will include an assessment of economic trends, growth factors and current and future housing needs in the municipality. In this regard, interviews will be conducted with such community representatives as municipal officials, social and welfare workers and the clergy.
Senior citizens will receive letters outlining the government's housing program and asking them if they wish to participate.
Some interested persons may not be reached by direct mail. OHC urges them to obtain a questionnaire from the municipal offices.
If the survey shows a need for senior citizens housing, it will likely be an apartment building, although consideration is given to one-storey units which do not require stairways. Apartments have a living room, bedroom, bathroom and kitchen. All apartments are equipped with stove and refrigerator. Rent is geared-to-income and the minimum is \$32 a month, including hot water, water and heat.
After considering the survey report, Council can initiate the program it outlines by adopting a resolution requesting OHC to go ahead. OHC borrows 90 per cent of the capital cost of a project from Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation and 10 per cent from the Provincial Treasurer. The Corporation pays both back with interest.
Housing on a rent-geared-to-income basis is part of OHC's Home Ownership Made Easy (H.O.M.E.) program. Those receiving questionnaires are asked to return them as soon as possible to assist the survey team.
