O.A.S.A. peewee playoffs

Crucial contest at Markham

STOUFFVILLE — It's all tied up between Markham and Stouffville in the second round of the O.A.S.A. Peewee playoffs. Markham had an upset 7-4 victory, Monday, and Stouffville clobbered Markham 9-4 Tuesday.

In Monday's match, Markham had remained scoreless for the first six innings at the hands of twirler Howie Jones. In their final chance Markham first edged in three runs, making it 4-3. Then with bases loaded and with Patty O'Callaghan on the mound, Bruce Dorey hit a home run to drive in the final four with the one blow.

Tuesday, Stouffville fared much better and outclassed Markham in the equalizing game. Stouff-

ville trailed until the fourth, evened it up, then shot ahead in the next inning with three runs, and added two more in the sixth.

Howie Jones led Stouffville's hitting brigade, belting a home run and knocking in two other runners. Doug Todd and David Lang also batted in one each. Four Stouffville markers were added on 'steals' by Doug Feasby, Ken Smith, Patty O'Callaghan and Mark Davis.

Patty O'Callaghan started on the mound, gave up hits to the first three batters and was relieved by Howie Jones. Jones allowed only three other hits and struck out six Markham men.

The deciding game in this round will be held in Markham Thursday (tonight).
