Registration opens Sept. 18

STOUFFVILLE - While it may be difficult to think hockey while fastball is still in full swing, the season, nevertheless, is right around the corner.

In minor ranks, from Mite through Midget, registration will be held Saturday, Sept. 18 and 25 at the Town Municipal Building, Civic Avenue, 9.30 to 11.30 a.m.

Fees for the season will be \$17 per player, to a maximum of \$45 per family.

The increase is necessary to offset additional costs anticipated for added hours and ice rates. The total budget will

approach \$18,000.

Leagues will operate at the following times: Monday, Pee-wee House League, 7 to 10 p.m.; Wednesday, O.M.H.A., 5 to 9 p.m.; Thursday, O.M.H.A. League, 8 to 11 p.m.; Saturday, Novice, 7 to 10 a.m.; Mite, 10 to 12 noon; Sunday, Bantam-Midget, 1 to 6 p.m.

The hockey season begins Oct. 18 and runs for a period of 25 weeks to April 10.

All persons interested in helping out in the months ahead, are invited to attend a general meeting, Monday, Sept. 20 in the Municipal Office at 8 p.m.

Handcuffs Bantam club

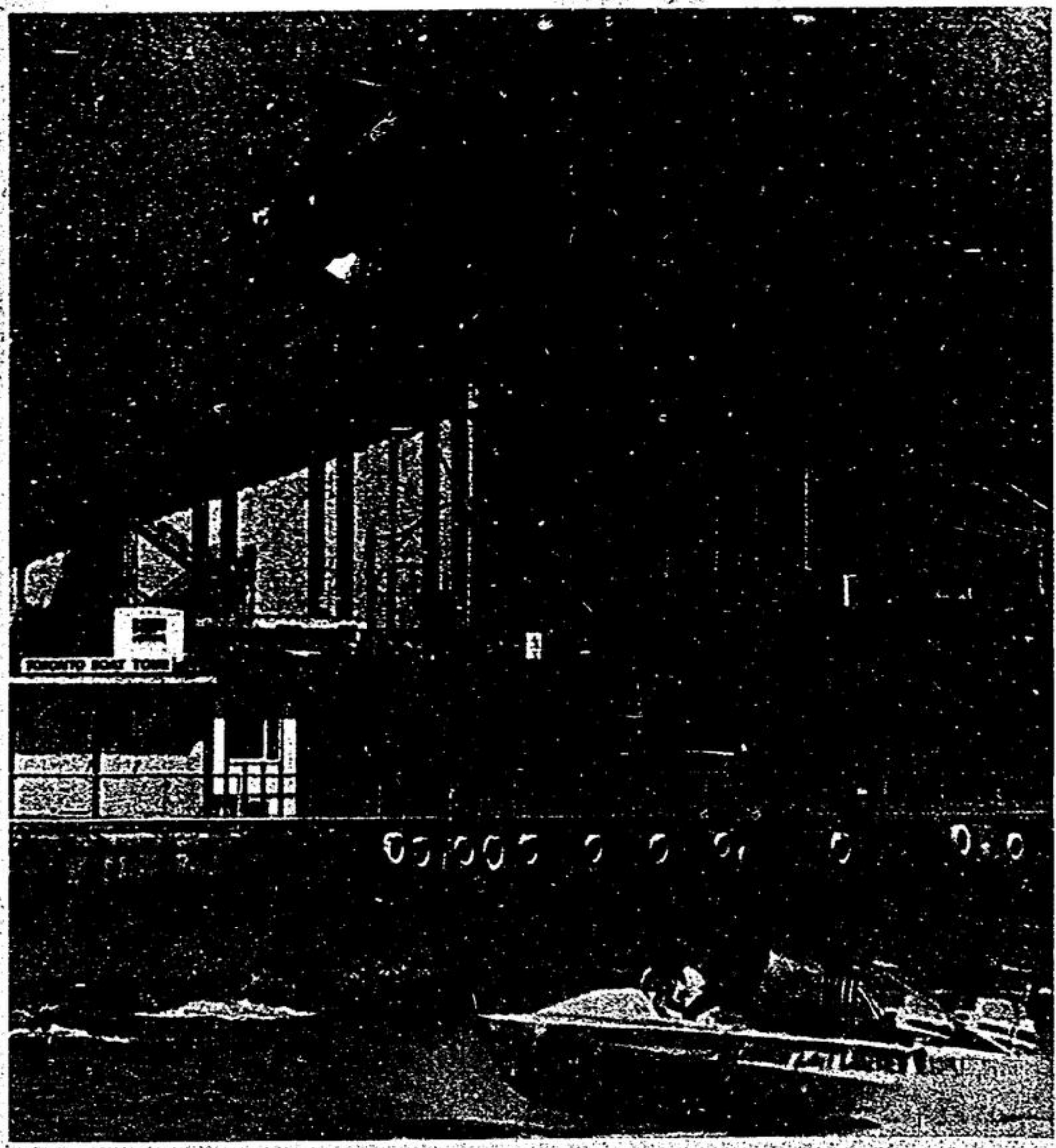
