UXBRIDGE - It will be 'do-se-do your partner and grand change around the hall' - Utical Hall, that is, as old friends from far and near, gather Friday evening for a few rounds of euchre and last, but not least - home-made sandwiches, cake and refreshments.
The occasion is the 90th birthday of one of Uxbridge Town and Township's best known residents, Isaac Catherwood.

It was ten years ago, that Isaac, then 80, held a similar gathering. At that time, he promised himself and his friends that should he be spared another decade, he would organize just such an affair again. Well, Isaac has survived, in fact, he's as fit as the fiddle that will ring the music out of the rafters, Friday. He may even do a twirl or two, just to prove he feels as good as he looks.

Isaac Catherwood needs no introduction to the natives of Uxbridge. With the exception of a 4 year stint in the West, he's lived all his life in the area. Mr. Catherwood was born on conc. 7 at Pine Grove, the son of George and Mary Catherwood and the youngest in a family of ten.

At age 21, he went farming out in Weyburn, Saskatchewan, but later returned to the home place where he remained until 1951. Isaac Catherwood is best known for his long career in municipal politics; a period that spanned 20 years. He served on Uxbridge Twp. Council, two separate occasions, including 8 years as reeve. He retired in

Mr. Catherwood can remember congregating around the old wood stove in Goodwood Hall, with a fire so hot and a room so cold, your back would be blistered and your feet would freeze.
During the period of statute labor, it was not uncommon to have a road budget of \$1,000. Mr. Catherwood has travelled widely, to Florida three times; the West Coast twice and the East Coast once. Although he seldom wears glasses, he no longer drives a car, something he misses. His first automobile was a 1918 Chevrolet.
Mr. Catherwood has two sons, Eldred, a farmer in Scott Twp., Delbert, a school teacher in Whitby; three grandsons and two great grandchildren. He lives at Sandy Hook, a community a few miles north of the Town.
On a typical afternoon, Isaac Catherwood will likely be found chatting with old friends on a street corner in Uxbridge or playing euchre in the

STOUFFVILLE - The Kinsmen Club of Stouffville officially opened their 1971-72 year Sept. 15 at the Sleepy Hollow Golf and Country Club. The evening featured the installation of the executive officers along with those of their female affiliate, the Kinettes. Deputy-Governor for Zone E, Kin Art Turner, was in attendance.
During the year ended June 30, 1971, the Kinsmen Club donated over \$2,700 to various organizations and programs within the Town. This figure included \$775.00 for sponsorship of the Juvenile Hockey Team, \$109.50 for minor hockey; \$169.74 for minor baseball; \$340.00 in donations to needy families; \$100.00 for instruction fees for the Drum and Bugle Corps, and the final payment of \$802.09 on the band instruments purchased for the Drum and Bugle Corps in 1966 at a total cost of \$4,212.58. In addition, the club also donated \$250.00 to Cystic Fibrosis and \$86.00 to the Mental Retardation Institute.
