Tells of steamship trip to England

 This is said to be the summer of the great migration. People, especially young people, are travelling in great numbers all over the world. Those from Ontario often go to Europe, especially

England. Times have changed. Mrs. Helen DeWitt, of Stouffville, recently stopped in at the Tribune office and left a small pocket diary. The diary, written by Mrs. DeWitt's great-grandfather, Robert Curtis, details a trip to England 85 years ago.

Robert Curtis lived in Mongolia, and kept the general store and Post Office in that village. He set out on his trip to "The Old Country" on June 3, 1886. The diary speaks of another era, an era when long-distance travel was done almost exclusively by train.

After taking a train from Unionville to Toronto, Mr. Curtis changed and took a train to New York City via Grimsby, St. Catharines, Niagara Falls, Buffalo and Jersey City. He embarked on the "City of Chicago", a 486-foot steamship.

There is much in the diary which seems naive to a modern reader - a touch of almost childish wonder. Mr. Curtis describes the ship thus: "This great ship steams by 10 horsepower engines... In the reign of Queen Victoria, even Jules Verne couldn't foresee twenty-five or thirty-thousand horsepower

engines. Some things never change, though. Mr. Curtis recorded that he was miserably seasick on the voyage. He felt better on the return trip, but wrote, with a touch of despair: "I am well this morning, but do not know if it will last".

Prices have changed also. Mr. Curtis mentions a few figures: fat steers, 20 pounds each; a 2-3 year old horse, 40 pounds; a "good dinner for 12 cents". Railway fare from Jersey City to Toronto was \$11.85.

Apparently '86 wasn't a good year for English farmers. "A cow is worth from 16 to 20 shillings, 3 or 4 years ago was worth 20 to 30 shillings". Mr. Curtis mentioned a man who "paid 39 shillings apiece for 10 lambs and after taking them to Hull he lost 15 shillings. He said you could not handle anything but what you would lose on it".
