Pickering pool cost climbs by \$88,000

PICKERING TWP. - The current estimate for Pickering Township's new indoor swimming pool is now \$438,000.

Estimates in 1968 were \$350,000 in total, but as Councillor Vic Rudik explained, many things have occurred, including increased costs and labor.

A further application to the Ontario Municipal Board will be made for \$40,000, to make the total up to the required amount. William Beddall, Architect, will be retained as the project manager at \$8,000.
