Late Milton Russell Active despite war injury

MARKHAM Rev. Donald Parr, St. Andrew's United Church, conducted the service, Sept. 21, from the Dixon Funeral Home, Markham, for Milton Russell, 85, following his passing, three days before, in Sunnybrook Hospital, Toronto. He had been in failing health since June.

Mr. Russell was born near Claremont, the son of David and Martha Russell. He was a motor mechanic, prior to joining the army to serve overseas.

While posted in France, he was wounded, requiring seven years of treatment. Although the injury restricted his activities in later life, he refused to give in, participating willingly in bowling tournaments and curling bonspiels.

Milton Russell was one of the original

members of the Markham Unionville Lions Club; a past master of Markham Union Lodge and an executive member of the Markham Fair Board. He is the last of the old Markham 'Armchair Club', that met daily in the Tremont Hotel.

Surviving is one brother, Charles, in Richmond Hill, and four sisters, Mrs.

Nellie Allison, Markham; Mrs. Norman Burton, Mrs. Norman Wilson and Mrs. Alida Dougherty, all of Stouffville. Six nephews served as pall bearers: Arnold Burton, Howard Burton, Roy Russell, David Allison, Earle Cook and John Corcoran. Interment was in Elmwood Cemetery, Markham.
