STOUFFVILLE - For a school which is in its first year of tennis competition, Stouffville District Secondary School has had an outstanding season.

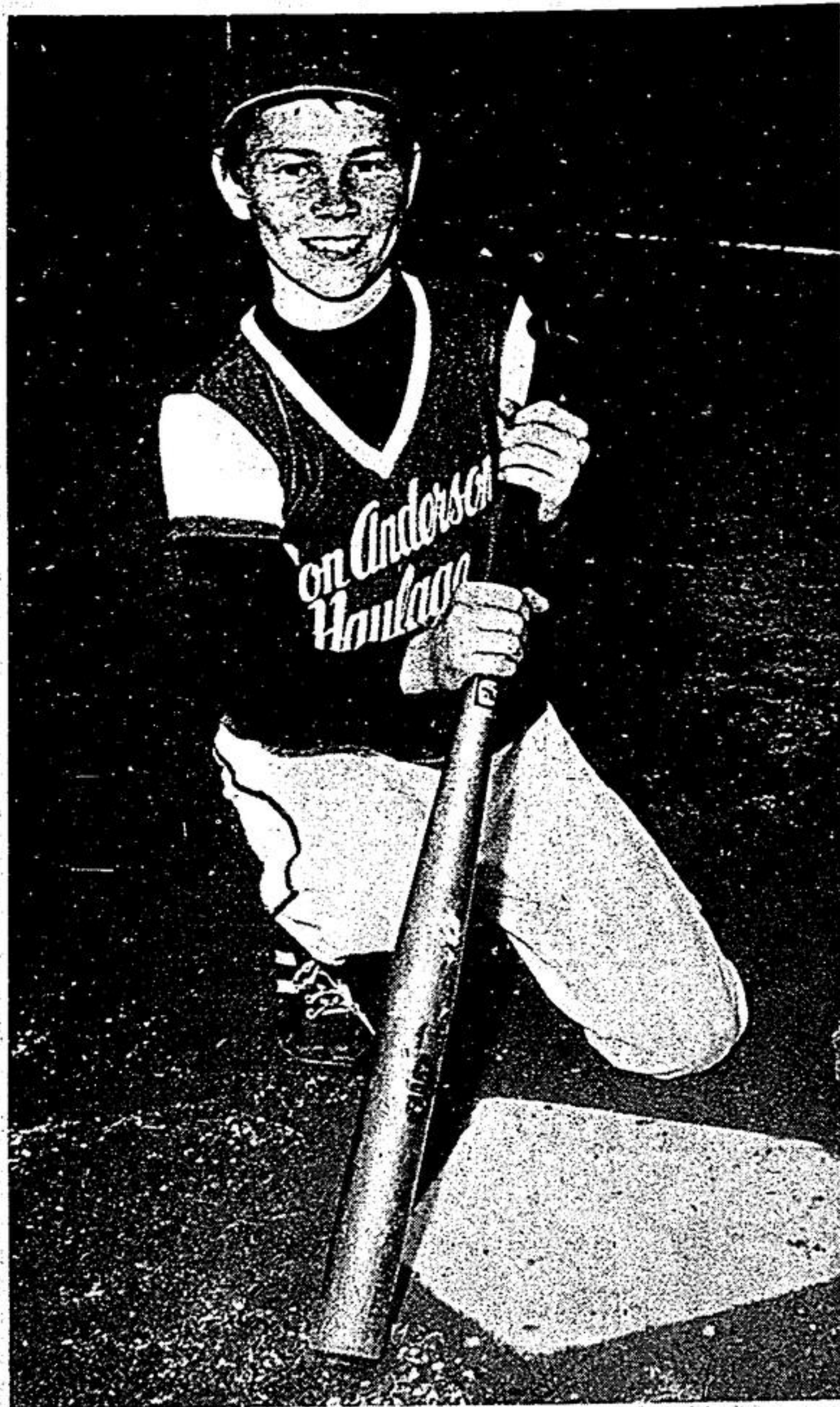

A well-deserved Ontario Championship came to Stouffville, Sunday, and a happy lad was 13 year old Peewee third baseman, Dave Lang. It was his hit in the first inning that scored two runs and sent the team into a comfortable 5-0 lead. The final score was 7-2.

STOUFFVILLE - As team captain Keith Acton leaped high in the air, the ball glued tightly in his glove, a boy on the opposite side of the infield cried.

Such was the reaction. For Stouffville, the all-Ontario Peewee Champions - jubilation. For Preston, Ontario's second best - disappointment.

But the feeling of being good, but not quite good enough, is not new to Stouffville either. They had to settle for second best last season. This year, however, they were not to be denied, winning 4-3 in 10 innings at Preston and 7-2 at home, Sunday.

For the players, it was a team victory, but for coach Jack Watson, it was a personal triumph. The boys would be the first to admit that all the credit belongs to him.

While the series' opener at Preston could have gone either way, the Stouffville team were deserving winners, Sunday. They were 'sharp', from the pitcher right through to the outfield.

At bat too, they looked strong, particularly Howie Jones, with a solid double in the 1st and a single in the fifth. And Patty O'Callaghan, with a crashing two-run homer in the 5th that cleared the left-

Preston's main offensive spark was lit in the 7th when two singles and a triple pushed two runners across. It was too little and too late however, to overcome the Stouffville lead.

Preston's Todd Jarvis wielded their team's biggest bat with a single and a triple.

Aided by a dazzling double-play, Mark Davis to Patty O'Callaghan to Keith Acton in the second, the home team played with confidence. The 5-run 'cushion' in the first, relieved the pressure.

The contest was completed in exactly one hour. Vin Walker of Whitby, executive member with the O.A.S.A., participated in the pennant and trophy presentations. The boys were then treated to a victory tour of the Town aboard the fire truck.

This week, many of the same lads have exchanged their bats for hockey sticks. It's been that kind of season.
