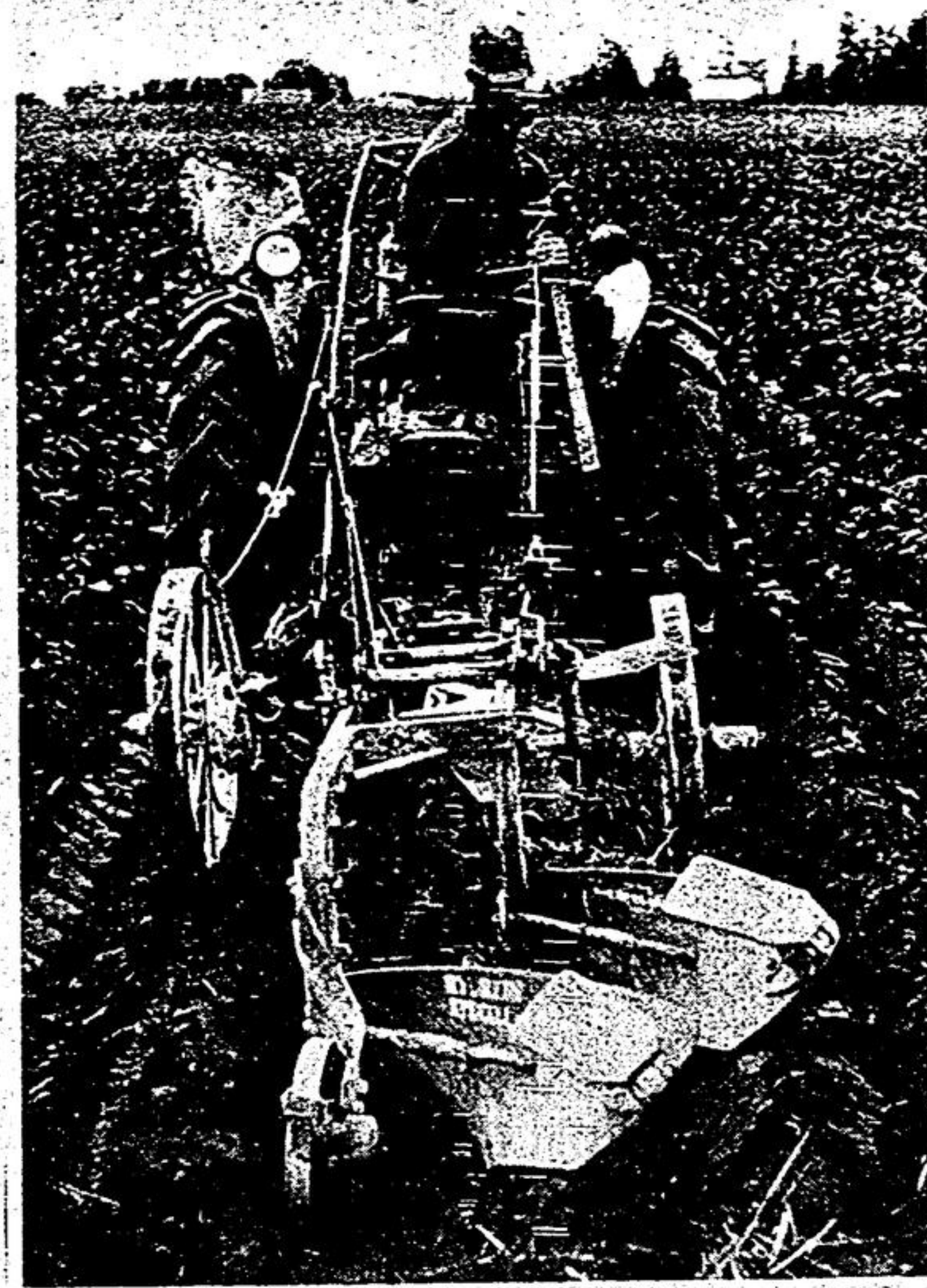


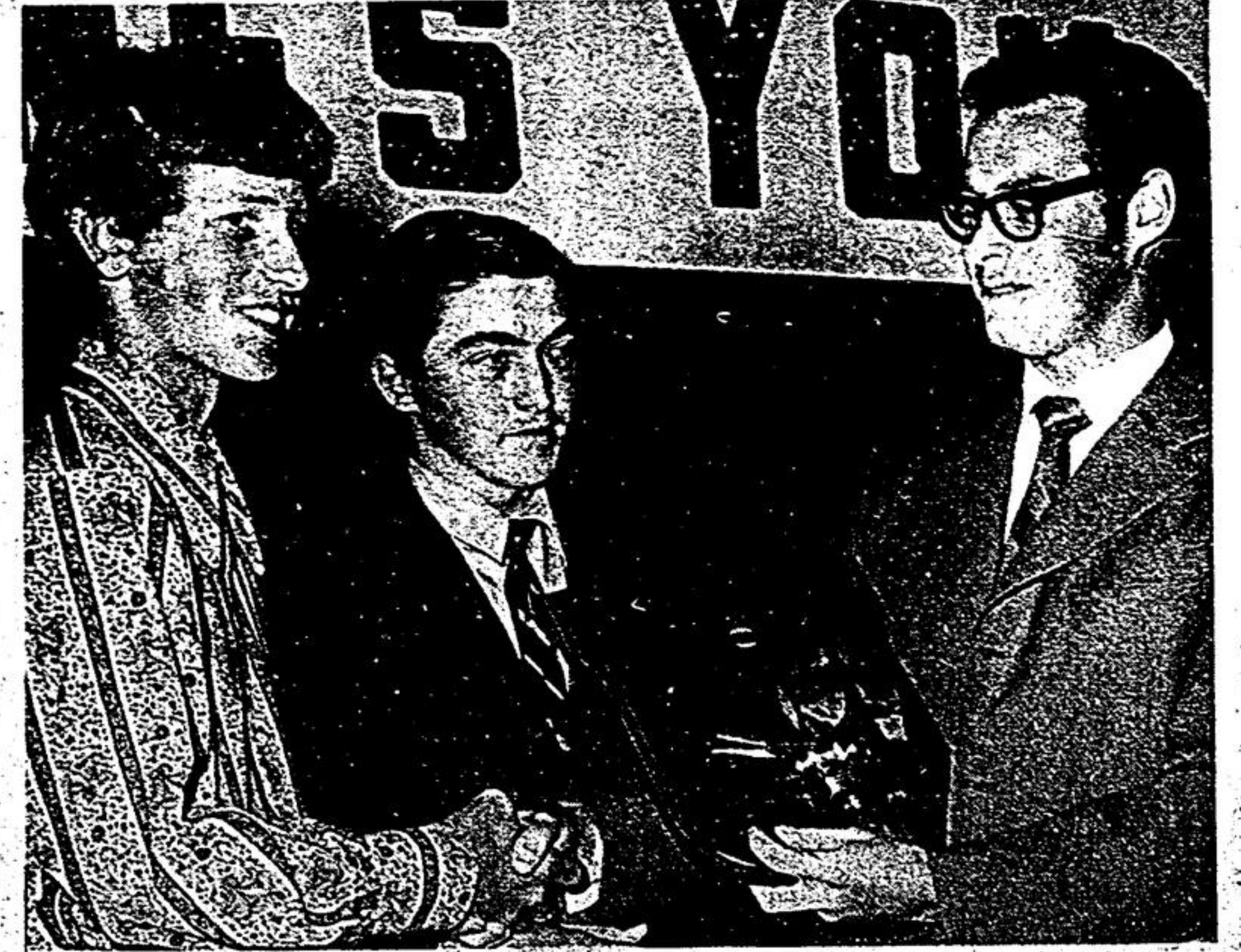
Plowmen — (girls) share awards at International

BILL HODGSON on Toronto Centred Region Plan

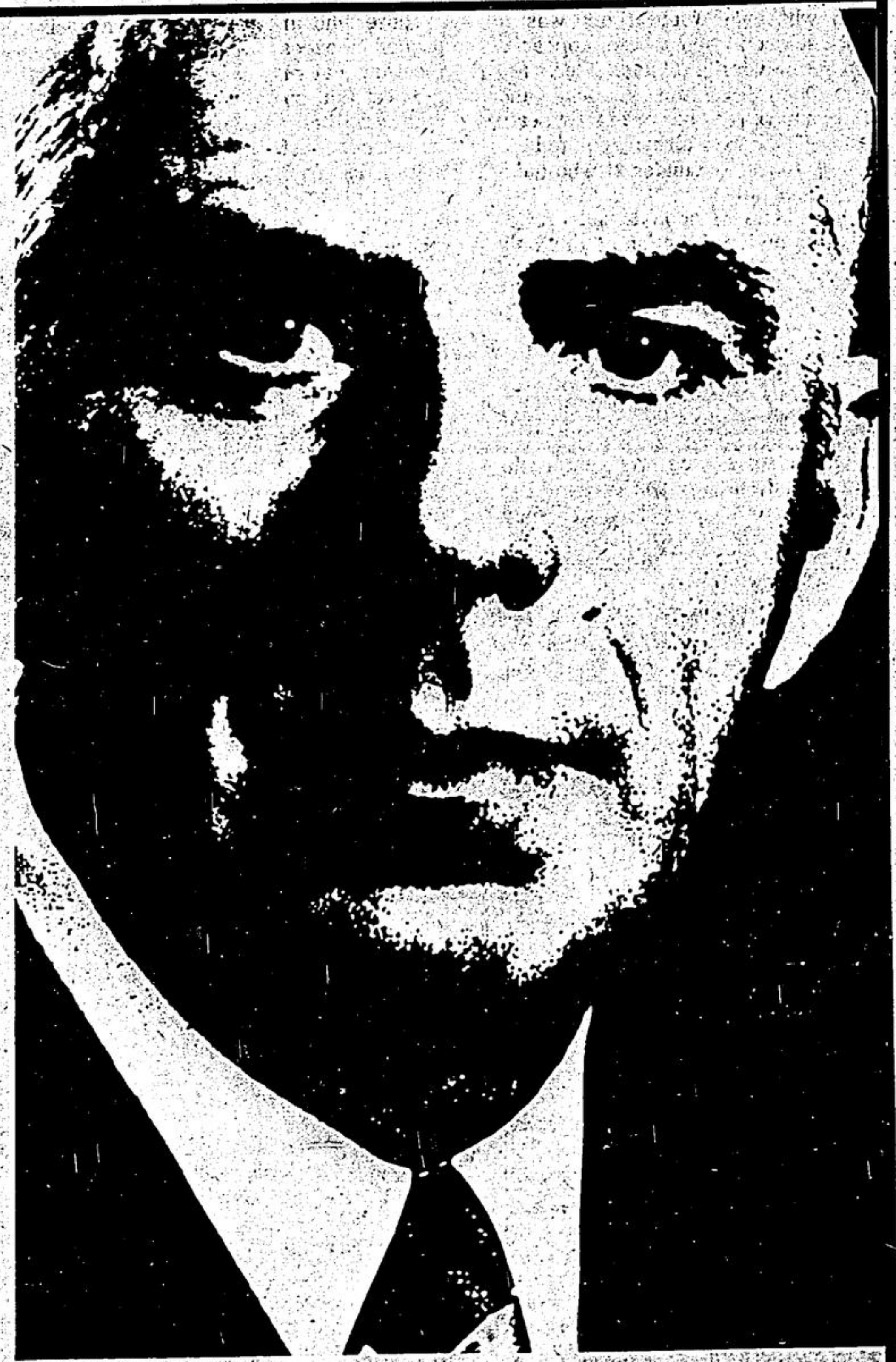
