Late Wm. G. Lawson

Former reeve

PICKERING - projects were promoted with similar enthusiasm.
 William Lawson was a lawyer by profession, living for a time on Greenwood Road and later moving to Mill Street in Pickering Village.
 Surviving, besides his wife, the former Bridget Gregson, and two sons, Hugh and Nicholas, two daughters, Hilary and Emily and one brother, Alan.
 Interment was made in St. George's Cemetery, Pickering.
Mr. Lawson, suffering from a heart condition, had been in ill health for some time. In spite of this, his death came as a shock to a wide circle of friends and associates.
 William Lawson or 'Bill' as he was known to most, became prominent as a member of Pickering Township Council where he later served as reeve.
 He was an active Liberal in both provincial and federal politics, but his leanings in this regard never interfered with his desire to assist with any venture, regardless of political affiliation.
 His personal projects were endless and to each, he gave more time than possibly his physical condition could endure. It was Bill Lawson who appealed to Ontario County Council for financial assistance on behalf of the Pickering Historical Society and was one of the party's responsible for making the site what it is today.

Presbyterian Church of Canada

Build \$125,000 'home' for boys

PICKERING TWP. - Under the sponsorship of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, a \$125,000 home for mildly disturbed adolescent boys, will be built on Rosebank Road, Pickering Twp.
 The single-storey structure on a one-acre site, will accommodate nine young people and a staff of three.
 The province provides a capital grant of \$5,000 per bed for a total of \$60,000. The Presbyterian Church must raise the rest.
 The structure is known as Fernie House.
 The building will be similar to any modern home with double rooms for the boys and a sunken living room with skylights.
 A township official admitted that some residents in the area were apprehensive concerning the project. Their fears were soon dispelled however, when they learned the size of the structure, the spokesman said.
 A building permit has already been issued.

will work for better value in education
