The time is 8 p.m.

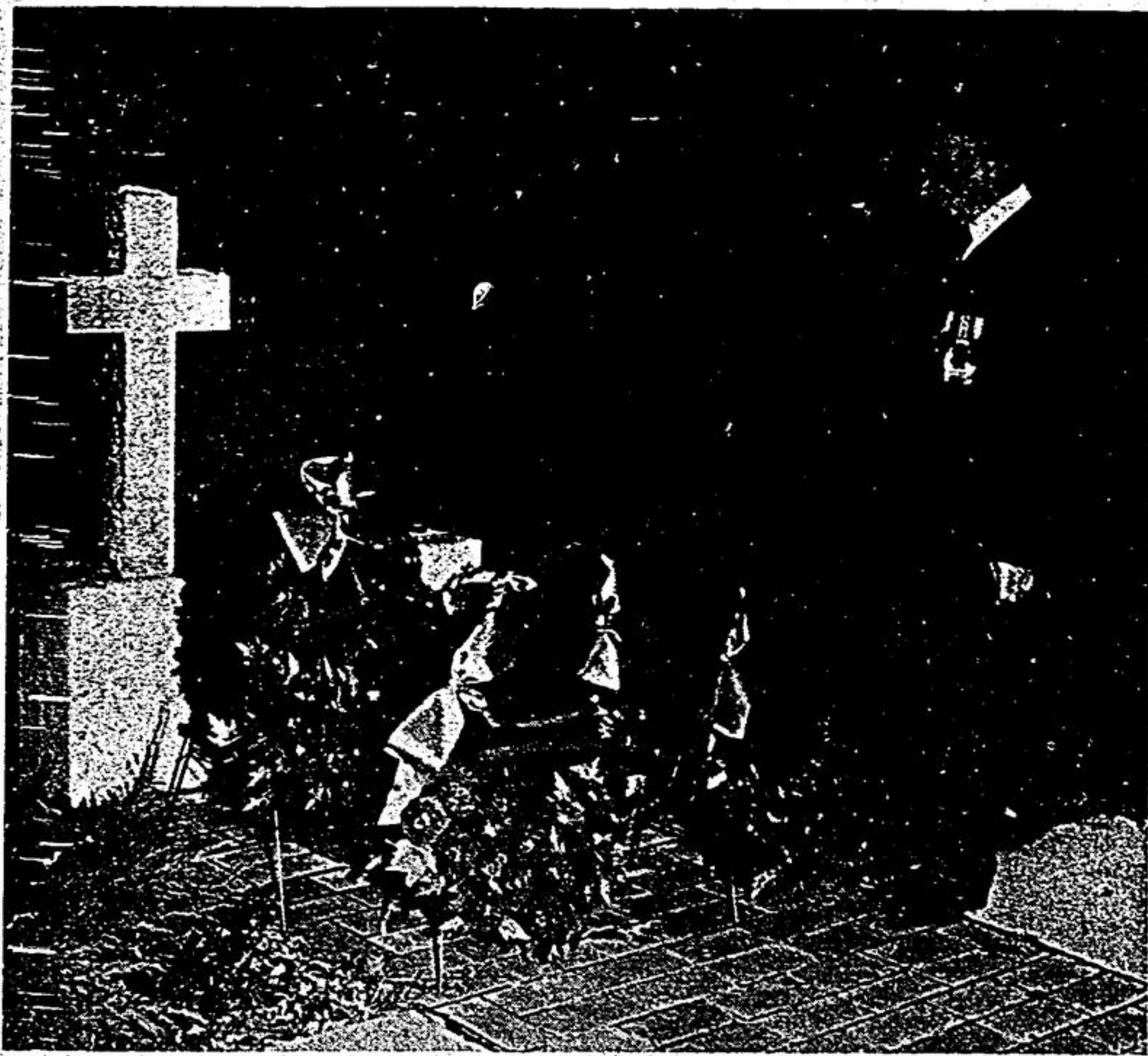
Local boy finalist

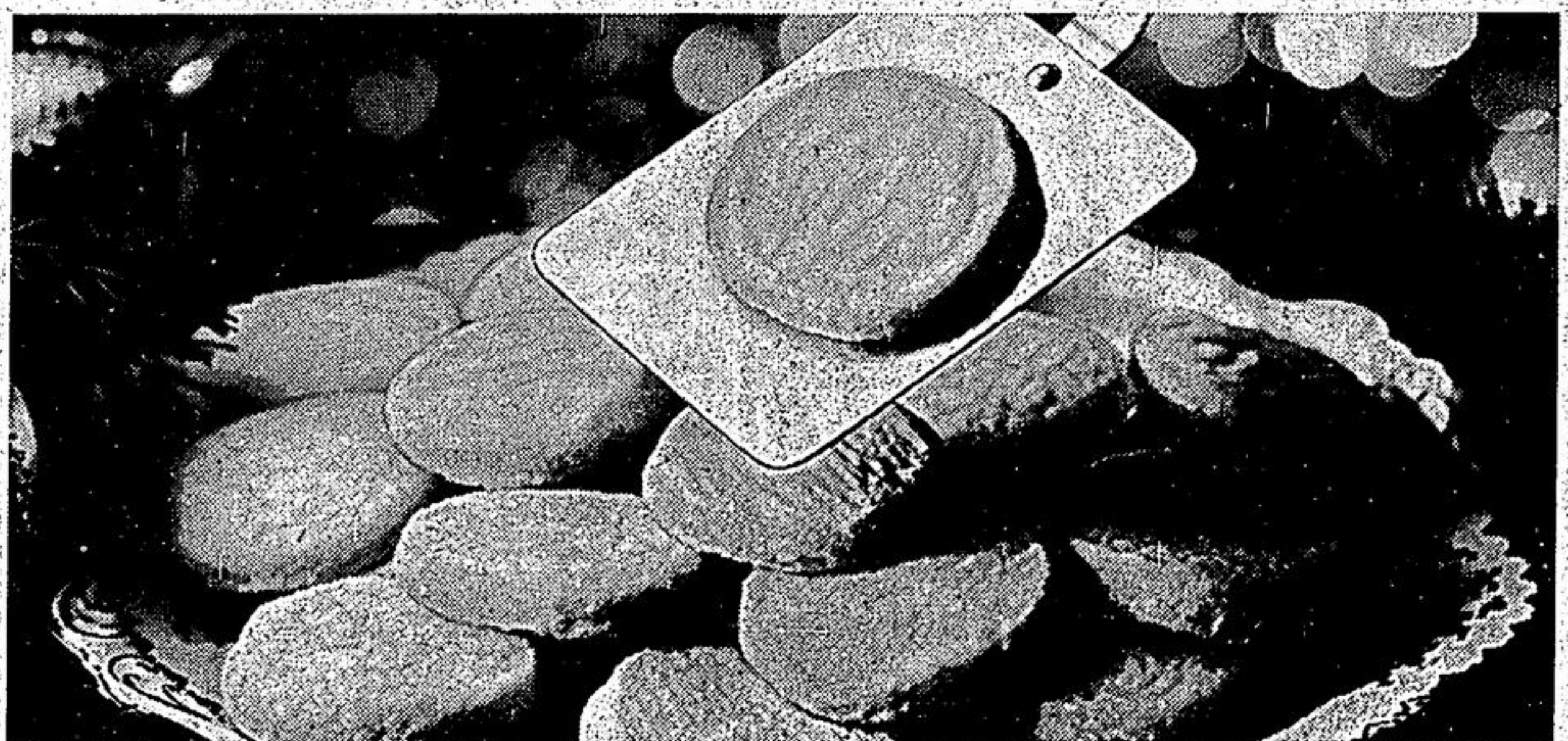
