Parkview - how is it different?

STOUFFVILLE - We are frequently asked the question "How is Parkview Home different from private Nursing Homes?" In many respects, there is little difference. Quality and type of resident care, fee structure and staff arrangements are frequently quite similar, although in some cases there may be significant differences. The important difference is in organizational structure. Private homes are usually owned by individuals and one purpose of their operation is the

profit motive. Homes for the Aged, of which Parkview Home is one of 83 operating in Ontario under the Charitable Institutions Act, are owned by non-profit organizations constructed and operated in co-operation with the Ontario Department of Social and Family Services, Homes for the Aged Branch.
