Bypass road for Unionville closer to reality

UNIONVILLE - get its long-awaited bypass. Present indications are that Unionville will

building a road to carry traffic around the downtown section of Kennedy Road has been a major issue in the past. It came up again at a meeting of Markham Council, Nov. 23.

Council members were considering various streets throughout the town, and a motion was made to exempt from discussion "Kennedy Road from No. 7 Highway to 16th Avenue, as

the Town intends to construct a bypass". This was later altered to read "...the Town intends that a proposed bypass shall be constructed".

Markham's Assistant Planning Director, Mr. Powell, said his department

had received a letter from a local resident, enquiring about this. He admitted that a study has been done on the Unionville situation, but said no presentation has yet been made to Council. "At this time, we have nothing for public consumption", he said.

Unionville Fire Hall

A central dispatching office



On the outside, the firehall in the centre of Unionville, appears quiet - almost abandoned. But inside, the equipment, including this fancy new rig, is very modern. And when the siren sounds, action is instantaneous. The Fire Chief is Meryl Smith.

UNIONVILLE - The fire hall in Unionville is not a very impressive building.

It's just a cement-block structure sitting back from Kennedy Road in the middle of the village. The front of it is taken up by two large garage doors. Unless you happen to notice signs saying "No Parking, Fire Exit", you might never figure out its functional purpose.

But things happen around there. Inside, there are usually three trucks: two pumpers and a tanker. A force of 4 full-time and 22 volunteer fire fighters man the hall. All are local residents. The volunteers are summoned by a siren on the roof of Crosby Memorial Arena.

There is no Unionville Fire Department any more. It vanished years ago, and the station is now merely District 2 of the Markham Fire Department.

Markham's Chief, Myrl Smith, is thoroughly familiar with the Unionville station. He joined the Unionville Fire Department in 1948, and became chief 9 years later. The former Township took over responsibility for fire-fighting in 1964. There haven't been any really disastrous fires in Unionville itself, said Chief Smith. Local units have helped out with some big blazes, though, notably the Thornhill fire of 1947 and more recently the Stouffville fire. The men are kept busy with training exercises, and a fire-prevention program is conducted in the schools and with such groups as the Girl Guides.

There have been some recent changes around the hall. A large radio mast was installed a few days

ago and this station will become the central dispatching post for all three Markham stations. Direct alarms from a few places, such as Union Villa, are hooked into the station; such alarms will be increased shortly.

"You can save 2 or 3 minutes easily", explained Chief Smith. Plans are also underway for the Unionville hall to handle all "after hours" emergency calls, such as hydro or water breaks. There may someday be a new hall, but Chief Smith estimates this is "6 or 7 years away". An aerial ladder is another future project.

Meryl Smith can remember the old department. At one time, trucks were housed in a garage next to his house, on

the east side of Kennedy Road. "For years, I used to ring the bell myself whenever a call came in", he said.

The future will not pass Unionville by, as far as the fire hall goes. There has been some kind of fire-fighting unit in the village since at least 1923, and there will be some there for many years to come. A strategic position favors Unionville, placed as it is in just about the exact centre of the Township of Markham.

The station is a friendly place in Unionville. When one of the trucks is sitting outside, residents stop and chat with the firemen. Like the Post Office or the Arena, the fire hall is a sort of mini community centre. It is impossible to imagine the village

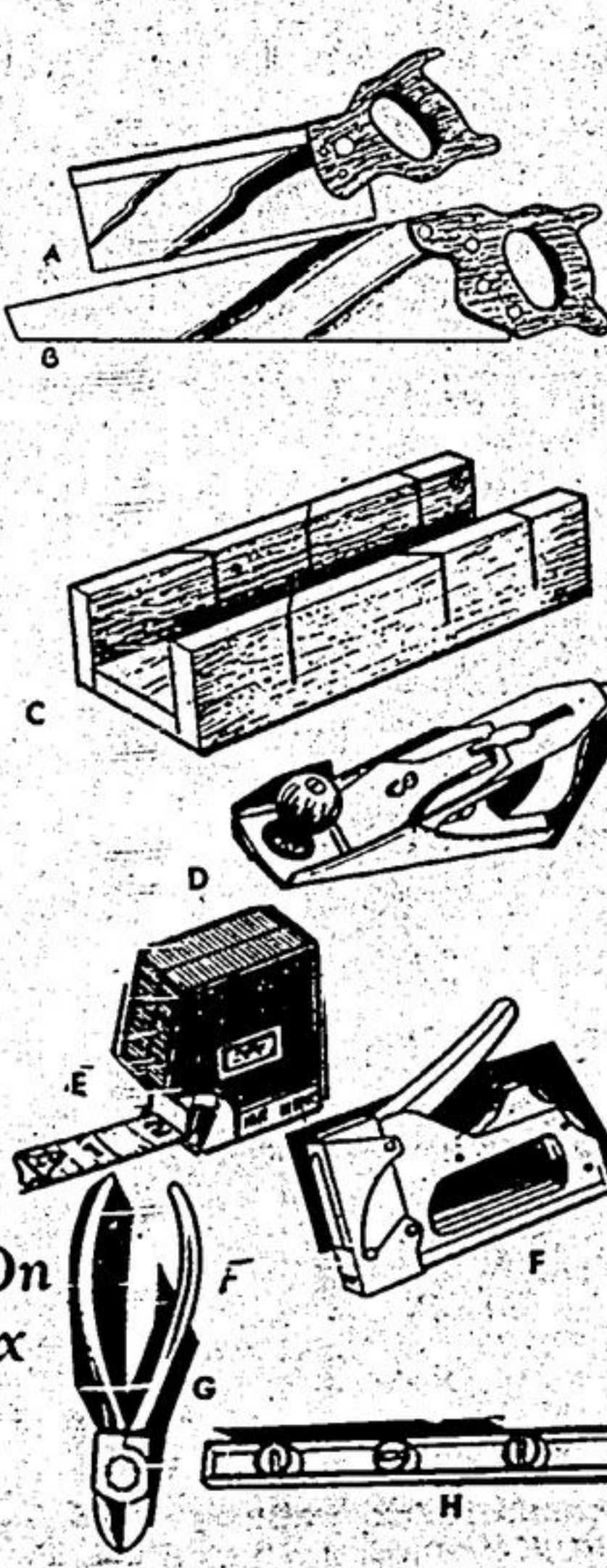
