OR Is there some connection between "GLORY TO GOD ON THE HIGHEST" and the peace eventually to be established on this earth?

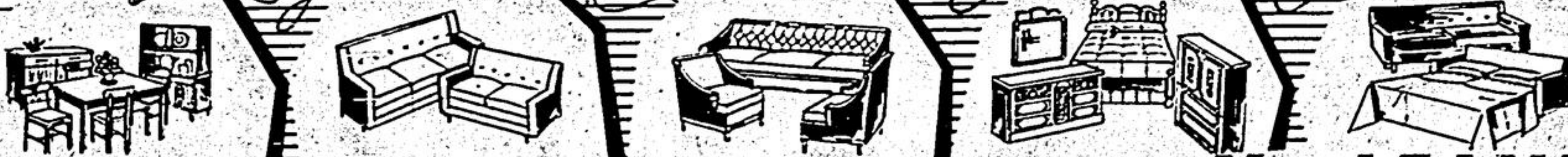
