There's not much joy in joy-riding if you get caught. This was demonstrated to Ronald Thompson, 17, of Riverview Dr., Markham. Thompson was convicted in Richmond Hill Court by Judge Russell Pearse, Jan. 4.
The court was told that on Oct. 26 Elwood Dunk, of Wellington St., W., had parked his car behind Taylor Bros. Transport, where he is employed. The Dunk found his car missing when he finished work, and discovered it in a nearby plaza with two youths in it. Approaching the car, he asked the driver, "Can you show me the ownership for this car?" The youth said no, and Dunk replied, "I'm not surprised; it's my car."
At that point the driver fled, but subsequent investigation resulted in the charge against Thompson. The Crown also alleged that Thompson, while driving the car, had challenged other youths to a drag-race.

PICKERING TWP. — Reeve John Williams has made a statement about a Toronto proposal to ship garbage by rail into Pickering Township.
The plan was announced recently by Environment Minister George Kerr, who said such a project could begin in 1972. Reeve Williams felt it would be impossible to prepare the sites in this length of time. He said it was his understanding that dumping could not begin until 1975.
Metro presently owns three sites in the Township, all of them presently gravel pits. All garbage would be shredded and treated, and the sites could eventually become recreation areas. A rezoning application is before the Ontario Municipal Board for approval.
Reeve Williams said

the proposal was first discussed in 1969, and the Minister's announcement was the first he had heard of it since.

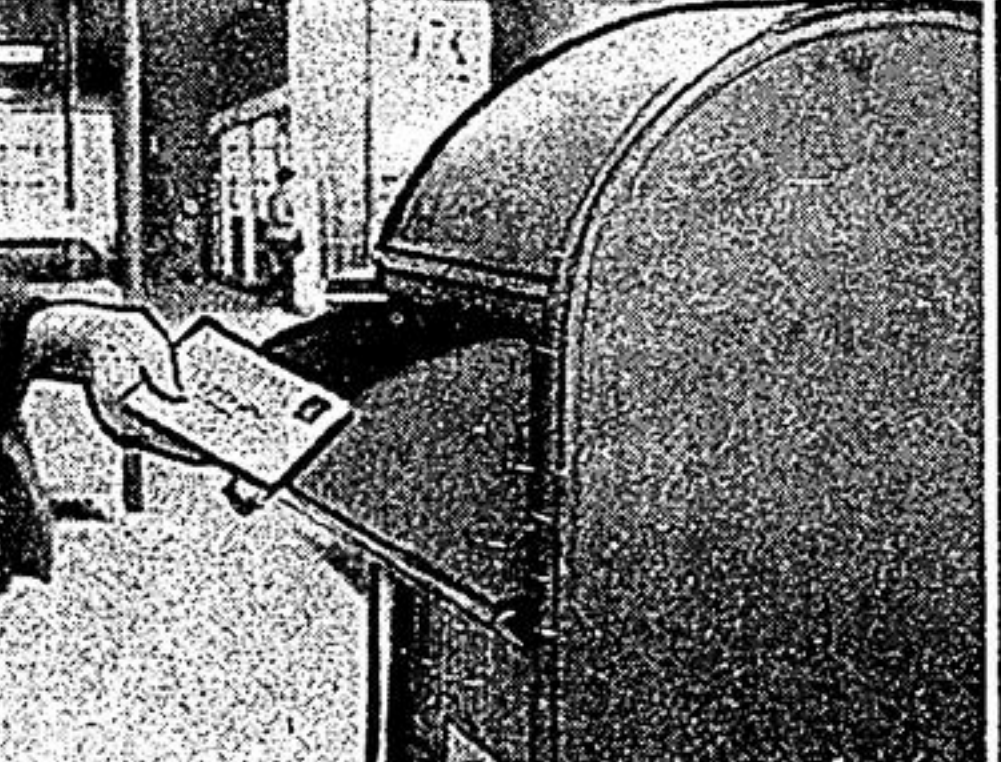

School bus safety soon a reality

Mrs. Candy MacGregor, R. R. 1, Gormley, has not admitted to making any New Year's resolutions.
She should. For if she's as successful in 1972 as she was in 1971, they're sure to become realities.
It was Mrs. MacGregor's resolve that the speed limit on the 5th concession of Whitchurch-Stouffville should be raised from the present 35 miles per hour to 40, to enable school bus drivers to legally operate the vehicle's 'flashers' when picking up or delivering children.
Although her initial presentation before Town Council found little favor, she was not discouraged.
On Dec. 28, an old Whitchurch Twp. bylaw was repealed and a new one approved, raising the limit to 40 m.p.h.

"If Council votes against this resolution, we are condoning a breach of the bylaw", he said, "you will have to make all kinds of exceptions, because you can't treat one person differently from another."
"There's no point in having a bylaw if we don't enforce it", he added.
After more discussion, councillor Lonergan asked for a recorded vote. Councillor Betty vanNostrand, who said she seconded the resolution "just to get it on the floor", voted against, as did the other five members. Councillor Lonergan was the only one to support the motion.
This defeat of the resolution will have the effect of instructing Mr. Miller not to take any action. Mayor Laushway pointed out, however, that it does not mean a building permit will be granted, or that the stop-work order will be rescinded.
