The plan was announced recently by **Environment Minister** George Kerr, who said such a project could begin in 1972. Reeve Williams felt it would be impossible to prepare the sites in this length of time. He

said it was his understanding that dumping could not begin until 1975. Metro presently

owns three sites in the Township, all of them presently gravel pits. All garbage would be shredded and treated, and the sites could eventually become recreation areas. A rezoning application is before the Ontario Municipal Board for approval.


