'National Brotherhood Week'
Discrimination - soon a memory

STOUFFVILLE
 Feb. 19 through Feb. 26 is 'National Brotherhood Week'.
 Stouffville, like all communities throughout Ontario, and all of Canada, is made up of residents with varying backgrounds in race, color and creed.
 How tolerant are we? How acceptable are they?
 Fifteen year old Charmaine Steele, Ninth Line North in Stouffville, is able to answer both questions. For, on her mother's side, she's Indian. On her father's side, she's English.

"There is a degree of discrimination in high school, but not as much as in public school," admitted the pretty auburn-haired Grade 9 student. "I think it's becoming less of a problem with each generation."
 Charmaine has a proud past. Her grandfather, the late Nicholas Plain of Sarnia, was Chief of the Chippawa Tribe. And Charmaine possesses many of those exterior characteristics, dark skin, pearl-white teeth and soft eyes. She points out, however, that due to her environment, she holds to few, if any of past family customs.
 On the subject of discrimination, Charmaine logically notes that this kind of bigoted thinking can work two ways, depending on where one resides. "Personally, I like to accept kids for what they are," she said.
 Charmaine feels the Canadian Indian is misunderstood. She said many people still think of them as people that wear headbands of feathers, "live in teepees and go around carrying tomahawks. She said that one of the teachers had suggested that her mother come to the school and give the students some instruction on beading. "My mother doesn't know how to bead," she laughed.
 What about T.V. westerns involving the 'good guy' cowboys and the 'bad guys', the Indians?
 "They're all pretty crummy," answered Charmaine, "they've been showing the same thing for the last hundred years." She disgustedly declined to choose sides.
 And neither should we 'we're all one - Canadians. It's National Brotherhood Week.

Whitchurch-Stouffville Public Library

Circulation increase - 5,139

STOUFFVILLE
 The Whitchurch-Stouffville Public Library, for its size, has more activity per square inch of floor space, than any other building in Town.
 Activity, in book-borrowing alone, reveals a membership in 1971 of 2,807, up 653 over the previous year. Total circulation during the same period was 40,590, an increase of 5,139 over 1970.
 But the program has been extended into other fields, some of which are only now beginning to 'catch on' with residents within the area it serves.
 The Library, headed by Mrs. Doris Lapp, has two main aims - public relations and improvement of service. "We wanted to make the Library better known in the community and to provide a service to a wider segment than formerly," said Mrs.

Lapp. These endeavors were instituted after the old Board was dissolved. April 27, 1971 and the Whitchurch - Stouffville Board came into existence. Board members were added, bringing the number up to nine. The population of the 'New Town' increased from 4,200 to over 10,000.
 In all of this area, Mrs. Lapp points out, there is only one library. Naturally, the Board, and the Librarian are concerned over the lack of library service in the communities beyond the former village boundaries. For this reason, a Consultant has been hired, to study and make recommendations on what he feels is the most efficient and economical program available.
 Current programs, as organized by Mrs.

Lapp and her assistant, Mrs. Barbara Smith, will be outlined in detail, in the weeks ahead.

Worship service proposed

Representatives from congregations in Stouffville and Markham, will meet Feb. 17 (tonight) in the Stouffville Baptist Church, to discuss plans for a 2-week series of worship services, in the two areas, in the summer of 1973. Following the meeting, delegates will report back to their individual denominations, before a decision on the program is finalized. Likely locations are the Markham and Stouffville arenas or the high school auditoriums.
