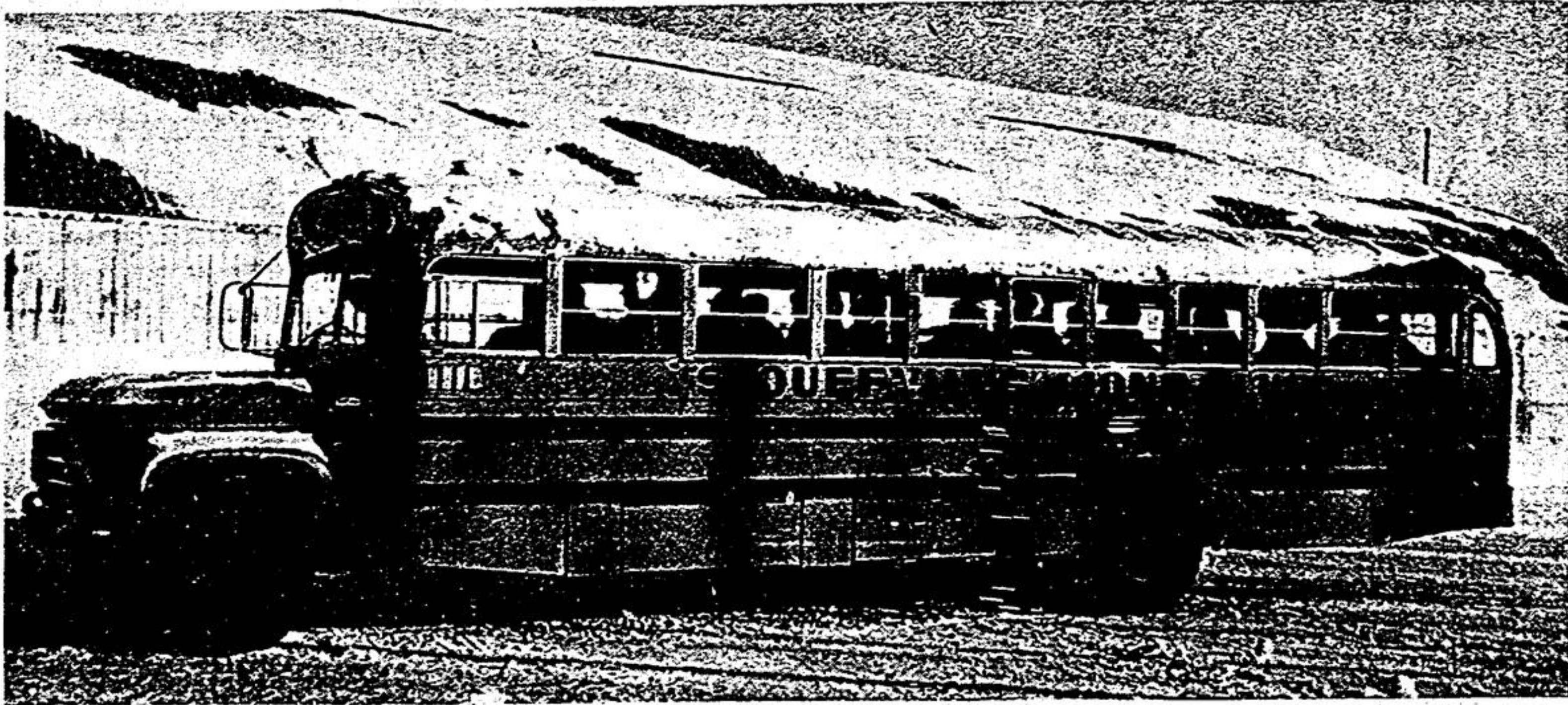


Boy struck by car

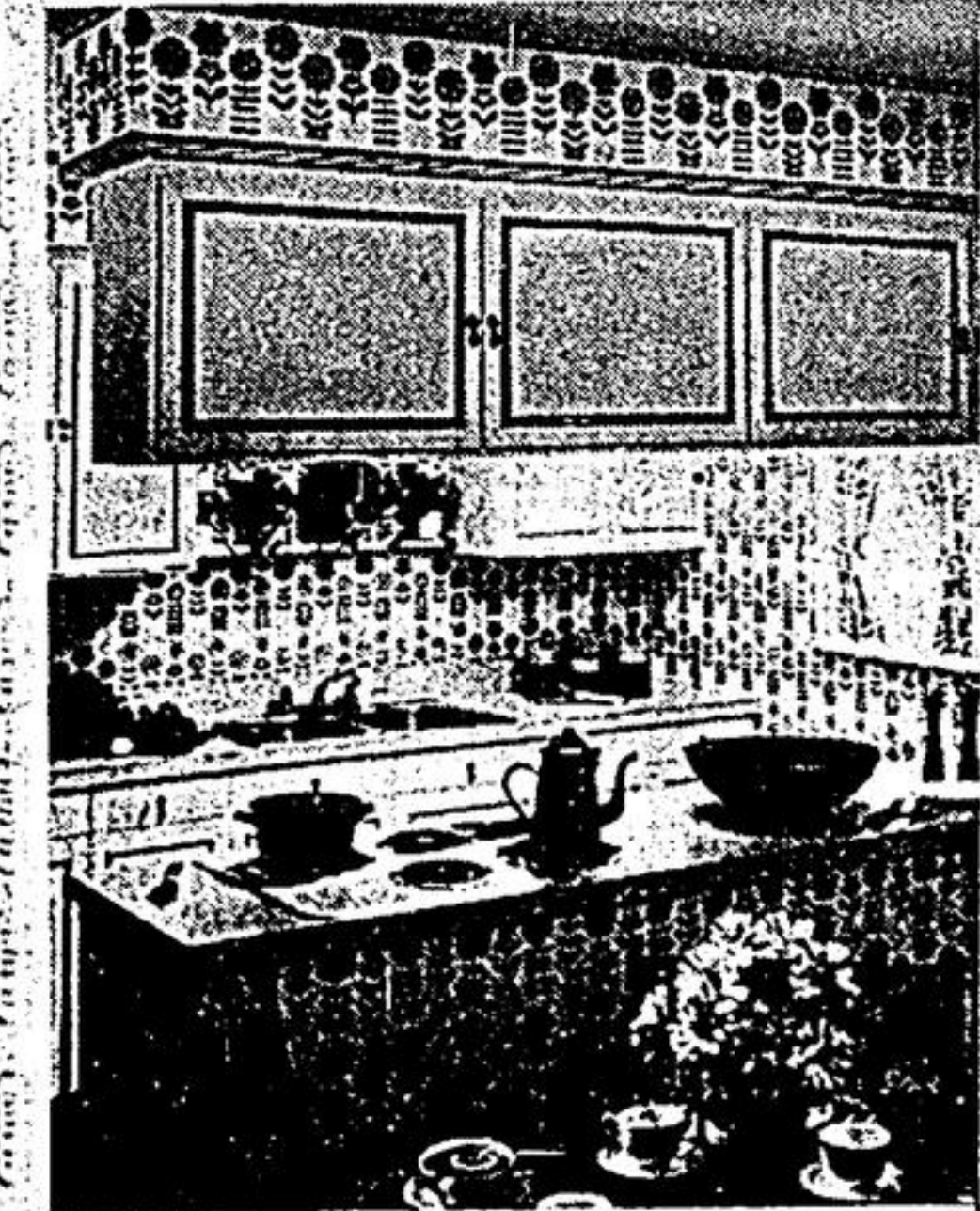

A complete recovery is wished for Mr. Clarence Steckley. He is home again following surgery in York County Hospital,

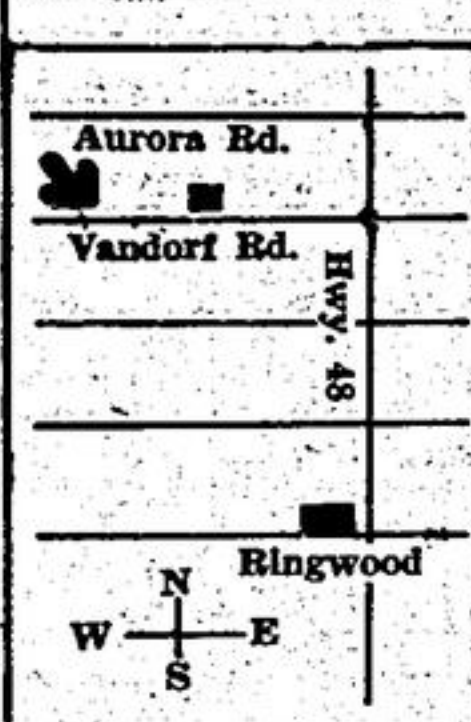

MARKHAM Council has voted to support a local firm, Taylor Bros. Transport, in a license application. Jerry Paxton, president of the company, appeared before a meeting Feb. 8. 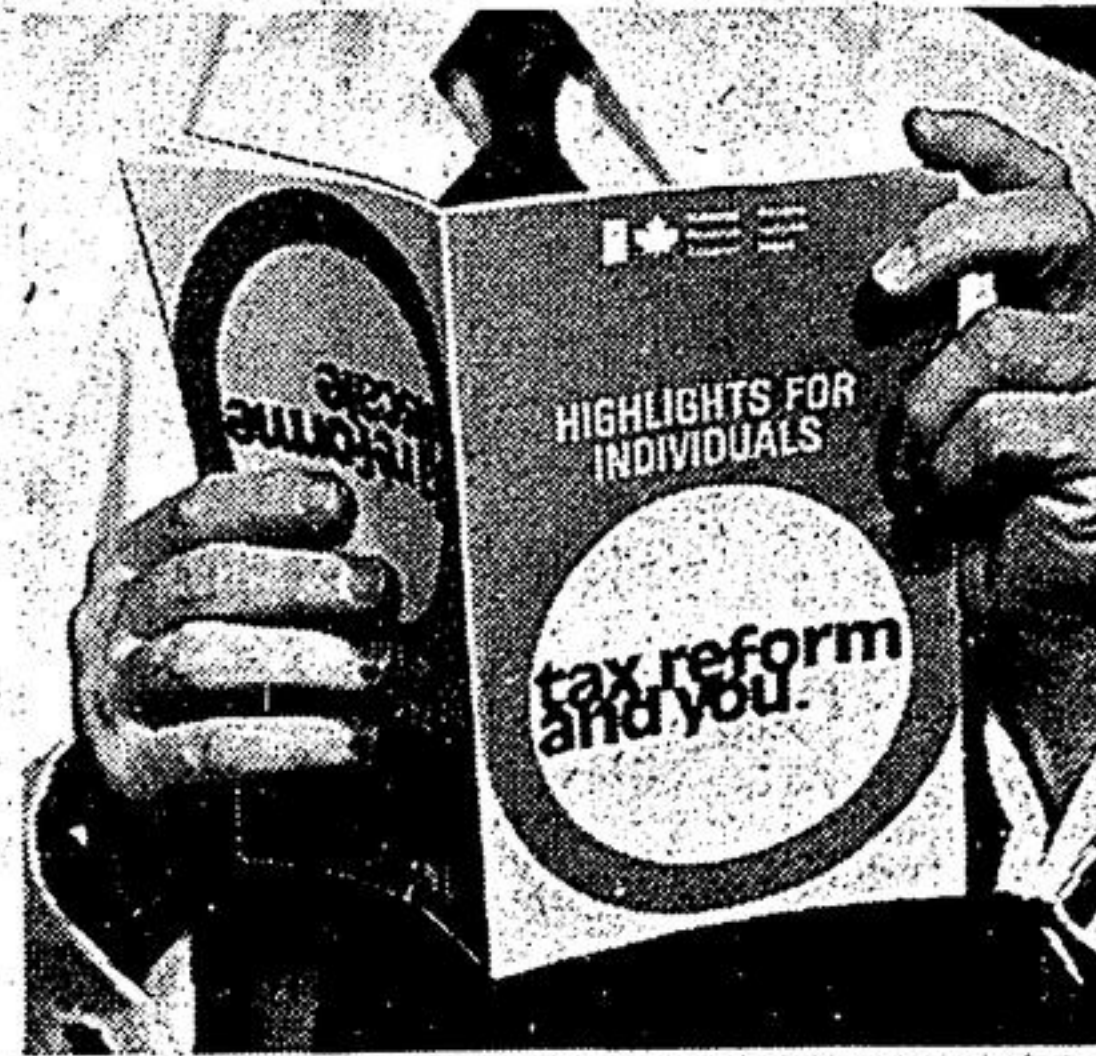
