Family pets lost

PICKERING TWP. - For more than two weeks now, a Pickering family has been waiting for the phone to ring, and for someone to say two lost dogs have been found.

Mr. and Mrs. Gus McNeill, residents on the Brock Road, were the owners of two purebred German Shepherds. The real owners, though, were the McNeill children, Jonathan, 4 and Lisa, 11.

"The kids really loved them", Mr. McNeill said.

The male, 'Duke', is described as 2½ years old, brown and sable, while the female 'Nellie', is only a year and has black and tan markings. 'Duke' had been a member of the McNeill family for about 5 months, when he was purchased as a replacement for another Shepherd, 'Laddie', who died. 'Nellie' had been with the McNeill's only two months.

Since the dogs vanished, Feb. 14, Mr. McNeill has checked with humane societies in Uxbridge, Markham, Stouffville, Pickering, Ajax, Oshawa, Scarborough and elsewhere without success. He has also advertised in local papers, without success.

Two children are waiting for their dogs, and Mr. McNeill has tried everything to find them. Anyone with knowledge of 'Duke' and 'Nellie' is asked to phone him collect at 942-2340.

Figure Skating Club

Seek financial support

STOUFFVILLE - The parents of children enrolled in the Stouffville Figure Skating Club cannot be asked to absorb a further increase in rates, president Frank Mellon informed members of the Whitchurch-Stouffville Recreation Committee, Feb. 8. Either financial assistance

must come from an outside source, he said, or the organization will 'fold'. Mr. Mellon described the situation as 'grim'. A breakdown of figures showed a cost of over \$11,700 for ice time in 1971-72, with an anticipated increase next season. Fees

totalled \$7,100. Committee chairman Edward Grimshaw said the executive deserved credit for past efforts. "They've really tried to make ends meet", he agreed.

Wilfrid Morley said the Committee had to justify the fact that sizeable sums are spent on hockey and softball, but not on figure skating.

Jim Thomas pointed out that with the Skating Club, professional instruction is provided, while in other sports areas, the coaching is volunteer. He said the Spring Carnival of 1971, a main source of anticipated revenue, had failed to attract large crowds.

Betty vanNostrand recommended the application for funds be filed through the municipality. She suggested the president forward his correspondence directly to Council, through the Clerk.

Favor extension of gravel control

STOUFFVILLE - Local gravel pits may be subject to new controls by the time operations begin this summer.

At a Council meeting Feb. 22, members considered a request from Uxbridge Township. The Township was asking for endorsement of a resolution they passed, demanding that Uxbridge be brought under the recently

announced regulations of the Pits and Quarries Act.

Mayor Ken Laushway revealed that he has talked to Department officials, who indicated that both Uxbridge and Whitchurch - Stouffville would shortly come under the regulations. Other municipalities mentioned included Vaughan and Pickering.

BALANTRAE - The Whitchurch Centennial Centre has suffered considerable damage due to vandalism in recent weeks. Several win-

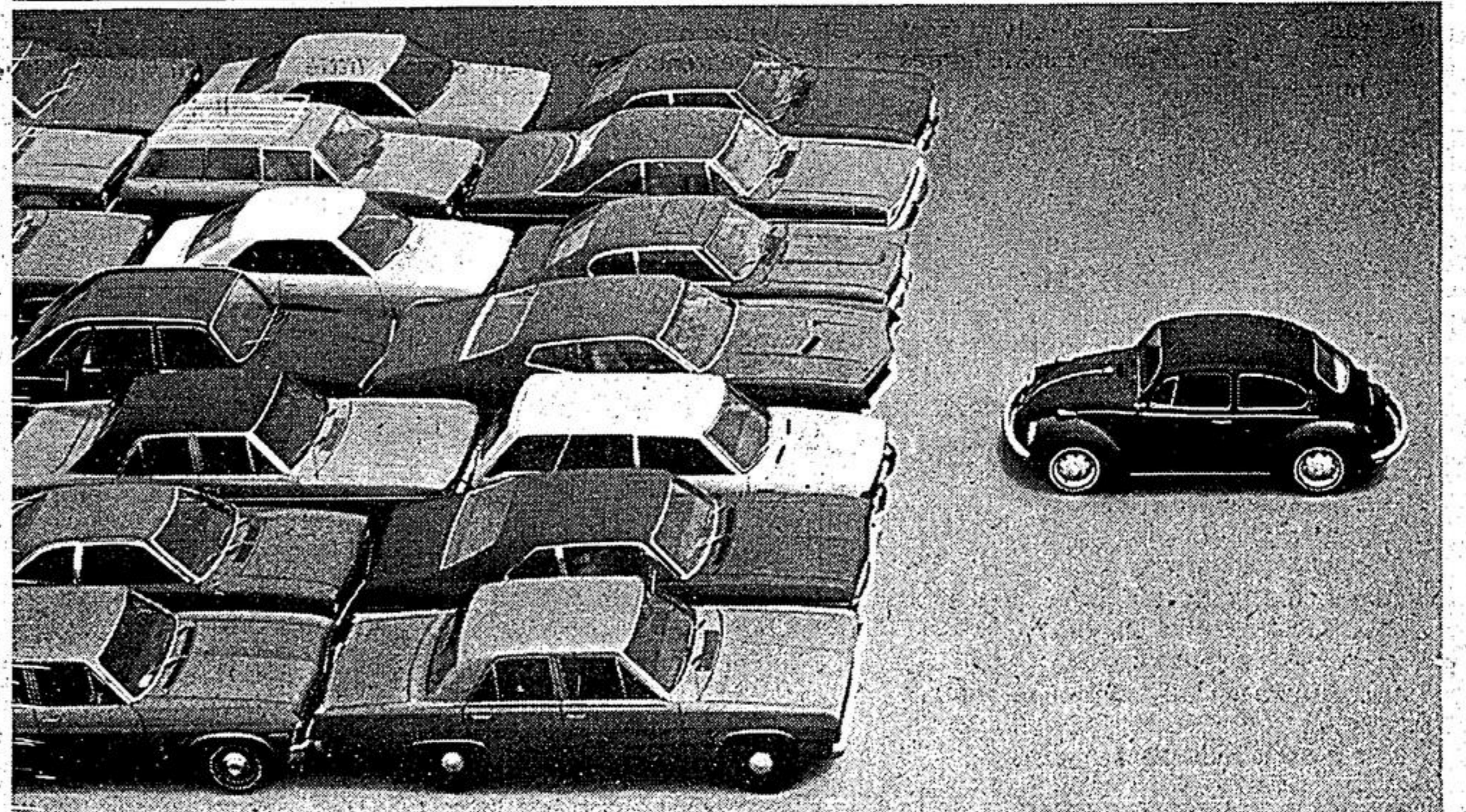
dows have been broken in the small building which is used as a skate-change room. Last week the most serious loss occurred when someone opened the door to the cellar of

the main building, causing the water pipes to freeze. With the return of warmer weather, the pipes thawed, resulting in a flood of water throughout the structure and a crack in the concrete floor of the main hall. Workers spent three days mopping out the mess. Mr. Herb Peach, Centre Chairman, believes much of the vandalism is caused by people using the skating rink at night. Further damage occurred Feb. 19, when motorists seeking shelter from the snow storm, broke four windows to gain entry to the building.
