On Sunday, he celebrated his 90th birthday.

The lovely home of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Muirhead, 7 Christman Court, Markham, was the location of the get-together, with the guest of honor on hand to greet each visitor personally.

William Muirhead was born in 1882, the son of Alexander and Janet Muirhead. The farm at O'Sullivan's Corners, where he grew up as a boy, is now an urbanized maze of homes, commercial establishments and apartments. But even so great a change cannot destroy the memories that the area holds for him. He attended No. 23 Public School in North York. Even that building is a thing of the past.

Mr. Muirhead attributes his longevity to hard work. He still speaks with pride of the fine crops he once produced.

He is a member of Knox Presbyterian Church in Agincourt. "Looking real smart in a medium brown suit, with a white corsage, Mr. Muirhead talked freely and cheerfully with everyone, calling most by their first names.

Markham, Ronald and a daughter, Mary, at home. A brother, Norman Sr., lives on Church Street in Markham. He is 87.

There are 4 grandchildren and 12 great grandchildren.

Campaign for hall curtains

Preliminary indications range between \$500 and \$1,000.

The community as a whole will benefit from the use of this building and we trust everyone will join in this campaign with enthusiasm; we only have to cite the efforts and interest of Arthur Latham as an example of the community spirit required to make the campaign a success.

Mr. Garbutt will be setting up a campaign account and the first credit is a cheque for \$50 from the Stouffville Players.

Our opening production in the new Community Centre will be "Come Blow Your Horn" a three act comedy by Neil Simon and production dates will be Friday and Saturday, April 7 and 8, Friday and Saturday, April 14 and 15. These dates have not been completely finalized. If sufficient funds have not been raised for the installation of curtains, the fund will be turned over to the Community Centre Board for equipping the building with the extras mentioned above.
