I was even more pleased to notice that the Town of Markham has forwarded a Resolution to the Regional Authority for implementation recommending that a by-pass be constructed around Unionville in addition to a by-pass configuration around the former Village of Markham. I compliment Mayor Tony Roman and his Council

on their action and heartily endorse this resolution.

But we must keep up the pressure. Anything which can be done to reduce north and southbound through traffic on the Sixth Concession should be done. For example, completion of the Fifth and Seventh Concessions would help to divert traffic to these much less used roads. The removal of the signs "Toronto via

Unionville" from their position at the northern end of the Sixth Concession at the Gormley Road, might also assist in cutting down on through traffic which contributes nothing to the merchants and residents of Unionville except a whiff of exhaust fumes and a little more wear and tear on the road. I shall be contacting the appropriate authorities to see if these signs can be removed.

It was at a meeting in my living room some four years ago, that the bombshell of the feasibility study showing a highway straight through Unionville was first tossed into our laps. It says a great deal for the dedicated work of many citizens and the interested cooperation of elected representatives, planners and developers that we are now at a stage where it is the by-pass which is favoured.

accident occurred last November.

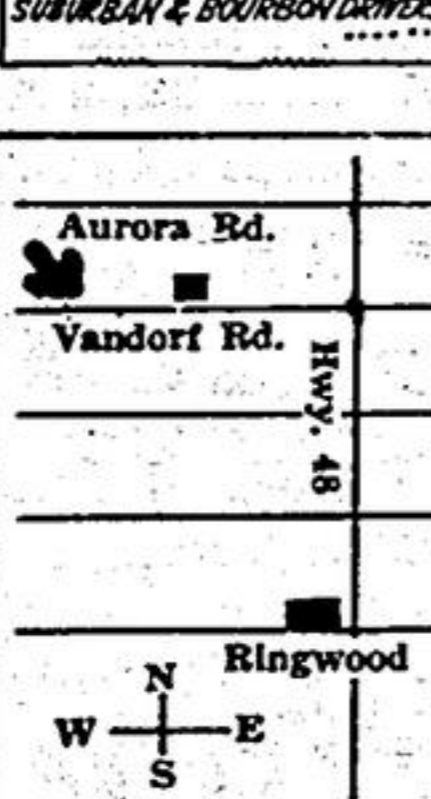
Miss E. Gostick has obtained a position with the Baptist Conference (Ontario - Quebec), working out of the church offices in Toronto.
