MONGOLIA - Fifty years ago, Clark Bunker stood nervously inside the parsonage at Whitevale, awaiting the arrival of Gladys Madill, his attractive bride-to-be.

On Saturday, in the Stouffville Masonic Hall, they stood together again, Clark still a little nervous, and Gladys, every bit as attractive. The occasion was their Golden Wedding Anniversary.

The celebration was arranged by their family and attended by over 200 guests, many from a distance. Included was a member of the wedding party of 1922, Mrs. Ella Mae Beckett, of Markham. Clark was born on the Baseline, near Pickering Village, the son of Frederick and Elizabeth Bunker. He attended school at Locust Hill.

The Mongolia community was their home immediately following their marriage. They later moved to Claremont and then back to the Tenth Line of Markham.

The intervening 50 years have not dulled the memory of their wedding day. A large marriage certificate is still a treasured keepsake along with a snapshot of their wedding cake. The cake, Mrs. Bunker remembered, was an elaborate one for its day, given to them by the Ideal Bakery in Toronto, operated by family relatives. Mr. Bunker remembers that, driving to catch the train for Toronto following the ceremony, the horses had to wade through

roul a foot deep. Mr. Bunker is still interested in horses. He keeps four Welsh ponies, a sleigh, a cutter and other similar horsedrawn vehicles. The couple have two daughters, Mrs. George Wilson, Stouffville, R. R. 1 and Mrs. Ross Anderson of Agincourt. They have four grand-daughters and a grandson. In addition to more than 130 cards, they received messages of congratulations from Markham Mayor Tony Roman; York-Centre M.P.P., Don Deacon; Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau and Opposition Leader, Robt. Stanfield. With their Golden Anniversary now past, Mr. and Mrs. Bunker are now looking forward to another milestone — their diamond.

World religions

YORK REGION - A study course on World Religions, that could arouse some controversy, has been approved by York County Board of Education. Initially, it will be taught in Grades 11 and 12 at Thornlea

Secondary School, with endorsement first, from the Department. The teachers in charge are David Snell and David Shanoff. Five of the world's major religions are included in the outline: Hinduism, Buddhism, Judaism, Christianity, and Islam. After studying the subject in a general way, students will analyse each of the beliefs. Education Director Sam Chapman revealed that the Department is keeping such courses under close scrutiny. An earlier study, offered at one school by the York County Board, was cancelled at the Department's request. The course may start in any grade, but the Department suggested Grade 11, he said. Board members approved the outline as presented. It will

now be sent on for Department approval.
