Stouffville - Let's toot our own horn a little!

Dear Sir:

There is a saying - "We are hiding our light under a bushel". This, in my own personal opinion, is the direct opposite of saying "We are Number One". In the business world, there is also a saying "It pays to advertise", meaning in big letters - RECOGNITION; no exact value in dollars and cents can be attached to this label.

As a newcomer to Whitchurch - Stouffville and having a certain feeling of being accepted and in a small way contributing, I feel I must speak out and hopefully get my message across. As a taxpayer, family man, father of four good sons and very happily settled in Whitchurch - Stouffville, here is that message.

Let us, each in our own way, stand together to promote Stouffville, the centre of our community life. I have travelled extensively throughout the province on business and I regret to say, only a few know the name of Stouffville, (let alone how to spell it) or even where it is located. This in my opinion is unfortunate.
