Doug Feasby scores in overtime

Bantam Title hopes 'alive'

STOUFFVILLE - Jack Watson's Bantam team is down, but certainly not out.

An overtime goal by Doug Feasby, Sunday, gave Stouffville a 3-2 victory over Petrolia, with the two clubs back here again on Friday at 8.30 p.m.
