

Bulk fertilizer is a time saver

By A.A. Wall, Agricultural Representative for York County. New methods have made a big difference in the job of getting land fertilized for growing good crops. New materials, new equipment and custom blending plants all combine to speed up the operation a great deal, eliminate a lot of the back-breaking work, and feed the crops better too. For a change, there is no increase in cost either. More efficient handling systems in the industry have offset the general cost increase. It's a good idea to

take full advantage of the situation. For example, bulk spreading before seeding can save a lot of time and work. Days are precious at seeding, and a seed drill can cover a lot more ground in a day, if the fertilizer has been put on ahead of time. It may work out well, to put only part of the fertilizer on bulk. Muriate of Potash for example, can be spread, and then a very efficient and economical material like 18-46-0 or 13-52-0 can be used in the drill. Nitrogen is specially important. We are putting it on at much

heavier rates than we used on corn for example, and the extra yield makes it pay. Separate applications of nitrogen at rates up to 120 lbs. per acre can go easily, using either Anhydrous or Acqua Ammonia, with Urea and Ammonium Nitrate mechanizing fairly well too, with bulk spreaders. Getting the right amount of nitrogen on barley or mixed grain is more difficult. Barley should have around 40 lbs. of actual nitrogen, and most of the common ratios won't meet this, without over-supplying either phosphate or potash.

Using Triple 15 probably comes close, but another is to again use the bulk spreader to put on around 100 lbs. of Ammonium Nitrate and then seed with 8-32-16. Custom blenders can, of course, make up special mixes to meet needs quite precisely, as an alternative to bulk spreading dif-

ferent material. Some precaution should be taken - in using high analysis mixes, to avoid seed burn. Nitrogen and potash are the culprits if put on at high rates touching or close to the seed. Using corn as an example, no more than 50 lbs. of nitrogen or 80 lbs. of nitrogen and

potash can be banded. If nitrogen is in the Urea form, the limit is 25 lbs. There are similar limits for barley, wheat and other crops. Sign in the doctor's waiting room: Ladies are kindly asked not to exchange symptoms. It gets the doctor hopelessly confused.

AIRPORT EXPROPRIATION ACT

Section of the Federal Act pertaining to expropriation reads as set forth in section 24 (2):

"Subject to this section, the value of an expropriated interest is the market value thereof, that is to say, the amount that would have been paid for the interest, if, at the time of the taking, it had been sold in the open market, a willing seller to a willing buyer."

Section 24 (9) (c) further states: "That no account shall be taken of any increase in the value of the interest resulting from the anticipation of expropriation by the crown, or from any knowledge or expectation, prior to the expropriation, of the public works or other public purpose for which the interest was expropriated."

THEREFORE, it is logical to assume that, based on February 1972 land values for 100 acre farms (\$700. to \$1500. per acre), this is the amount the government may possibly be willing to pay for Airport property.

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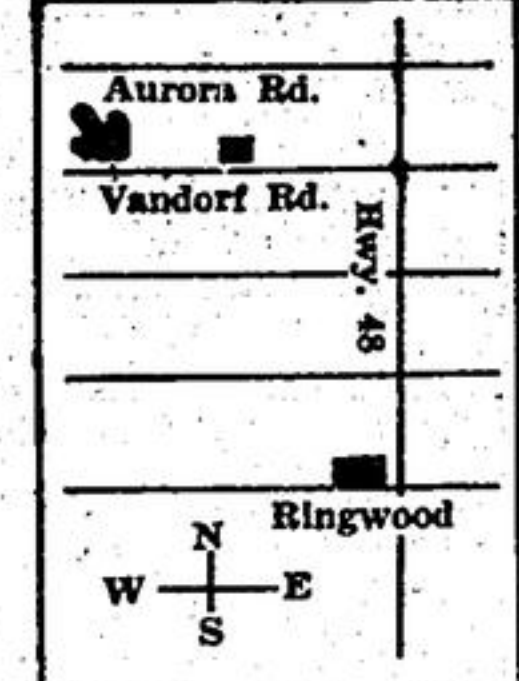
