## Uxbridge Pool project

## Time factor important - Lennox

UXBRIDGE - In an effort to clear up many questions concerning the proposed Uxbridge indoor swimming pool, a statement has been released by Dr. Lennox, chairman of the special sub-committee established to deal with the project.

The committee points out that consideration was earlier given to a heated outdoor pool, but this was considered impractical. An indoor pool proved prohibitive in cost until the federal government announced its winter works program in November, 1971.

After considerable investigation, the sub-committee obtained a loan of \$262,000 for the venture. Approximately \$106,000 of this, the amount needed for on-site labor costs, is "forgivable" if work is completed by May

31. This would reduce the town's actual loan to \$148,000. At the end of March, according to the release, a verbal commitment was made by provincial officials to supply \$25,000 under the Community Centres Act, which would leave a balance of \$123,000 to be repaid to the federal government.

As cost estimates were revised several times during the planning process, the sub-committee was unable to consult with local firms. It is still hopeful, however, that local trades "will be utilized as much as possible in the project."

Time has been an important factor in the project. Uxbridge Town Council had to seek Ontario Municipal Board approval to proceed, and this was not given until March 21.

The sub-committee's release points out that the new pool will serve a much wider area than the Town of Uxbridge, and it is for this reason that neighboring municipalities have been approached for financial contributions. A campaign for individual donations will be conducted in the area, all such donations being tax-deductible. The Uxbridge Centennial Committee is co-operating wholeheartedly, and will direct all its surplus revenues towards the project.

The statement expresses the hope that all local residents will help in this undertaking, and that the complex may end up almost debt-free. It is proposed that the pool and its allied facilities will be operated jointly by the Town of Uxbridge, the Township of Scott, and the Township of Ux-
