It was 6-3 in Caledonia's favor, Wednesday, taking the series 4 games to 2.

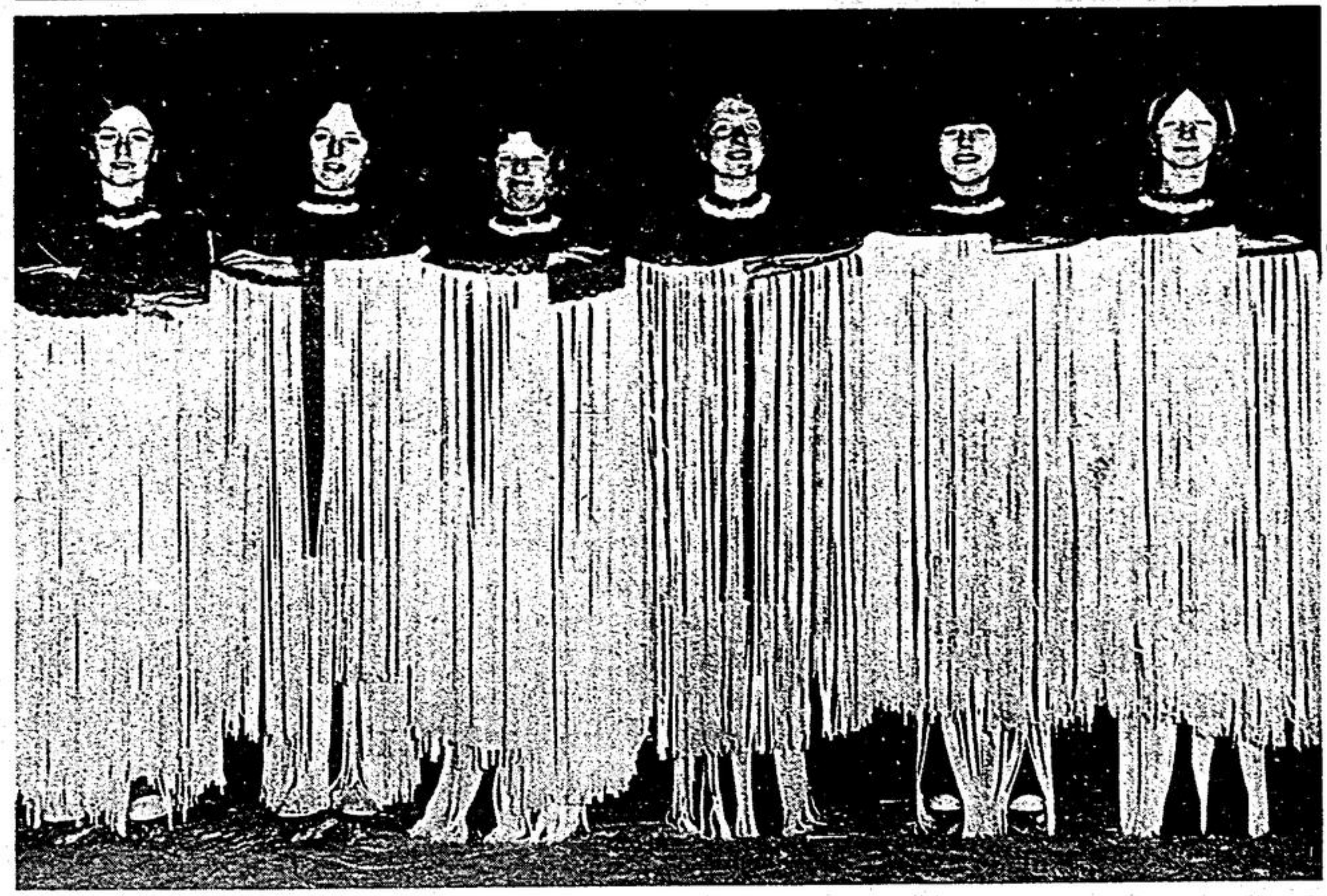

X-RAY EXAMINATIONS
