Speakers at Airport meeting

Evasive on 'hard facts'

MARKHAM - 'POP' means to make quick, explosive sounds. In this respect, it's a fitting abbreviation for an organization that's been making similar sounds against a second Toronto airport over the past month.

The 'People Over Planes' organization, aiming its loaded questions directly at Ottawa and Transport Minister Jamieson, was informed by Barney Danson, M.P. (York-North) at the Tuesday night rally in Markham Dist. High School, that a meeting has been arranged for April 24. Mr. Jamieson will meet with POP and the area's federal-provincial representatives to discuss evaluations contained in the government's 'new Airport Study, which supersedes one made public a few days ago.

Over a thousand people jammed the auditorium. All, like the POP people, seeking information - 'hard facts'. Mr. Danson and local M.P.P. Don Deacon were unable to provide this, except when one instant questioner demanded to know which government was responsible for choosing the Pickering site. It was made clear that the decision to have another airport was federal - the choice of Pickering was provincial.

Dr. Charles Godfrey, chairman of POP, made his anti-airport presentation with humor, never cynical or sarcastic, that registered effectively with the audience. He affirmed that facts are needed to determine who would win the cause, but said that he believed a percentage of emotion is necessary too.

During the evening, James Crang, whose company designed and hoped to promote an aquaport on Lake Ontario, said his research showed that car and aeroplane are incompatible and that passenger terminals

The Expropriations Act

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL TO EXPROPRIATE LAND

IN THE MATTER of an application by the Minister of Transportation and Communications for approval to expropriate lands in the Town of Whitechurch-Stouffville, in the Regional Municipality of York, in the Province of Ontario for the purpose of acquiring sufficient land for the widening and reconstruction of Highway Number 47.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that application has been made for approval to expropriate the land described in the schedule hereto. Any owner of lands in respect of which notice is given who desires an inquiry into whether the taking of such land is fair, sound and reasonably necessary in the achievement of the objectives of the expropriating authority shall so notify the approving authority in writing.

(a) in the case of a registered owner, service personally or by registered mail within thirty days after he is served with publication, within thirty days after the first publication of the notice;

(b) in the case of an owner who is not a registered owner, within thirty days after the first publication of the notice.

NOTES:

1. The Expropriations Act, provides that,

(a) where an inquiry is requested, it shall be conducted by an inquiry officer appointed by the Minister of Justice and Attorney General;

(b) the inquiry officer,

(i) shall give every party to the inquiry an opportunity to present evidence and argument and to examine and cross-examine witnesses, either personally or by his counsel or agent, and

(ii) may recommend to the approving authority that a party to the inquiry be paid a fixed amount for his costs of the inquiry not to exceed \$200 and the approving authority may in its discretion order the expropriating authority to pay such costs forthwith.

2. "owner" and "registered owner" are defined in the Act as follows:

"owner" includes a mortgagee, tenant, execution creditor, a person entitled to a limited estate or interest in land, a committee of the estate of a mentally incompetent person or of a person incapable of managing his affairs, and a guardian executor, administrator or trustee in whom land is vested;

"registered owner" means an owner of land whose interest in the land is defined and whose name is specified in an instrument in the proper registry, land titles or sheriff's office, and includes a person shown as a tenant of land on the last revised assessment roll;

3. The expropriating authority, each owner who notifies the approving authority that he desires a hearing in respect of the lands intended to be expropriated and any owner added as a party by the inquiry officer are parties to the inquiry.
