Uxbridge demands airport answers

GOODWOOD - The senior governments have made Township Council "obsolete" according to Mrs. Eleanor Todd, of Goodwood.

Mrs. Todd's letter was discussed at a meeting Apr. 17. She stated her objection to the Airport and asked whether Council could provide additional details about the site.

Clerk Don Kennedy revealed he has been unable to arrange a meeting between Council, and the project representatives, and added - "They can't answer the question you want answered anyway".

Reeve Bob Nesbitt did not appear pleased concerning this. "I want to know how they're going to protect people from problems like noise and pollution", he stated. "I can't take a stand one way or the other until we get some answers".

· "What about compensation for our loss in assessment?" asked the Reeve.

"Tell them to get off their backsides", suggested Councillor Frank Hendy.

A period of heated discussion followed. At one point, Councillor Clark Muirhead suggested that, in some instances, there might be a sound case for legal action against the federal or provincial governments.

A resolution was put forward by Mr. Muirhead, seconded by Mr. Hendy, to seek some answers. Specific questions are: (1) Who will be responsible for (2) Who is to be responsible for maintenance of roads in the expropriated area;

(3) What grants will be paid to the municipality in lieu of taxes, and how will the amounts be determined; and (4) How will people in the land
