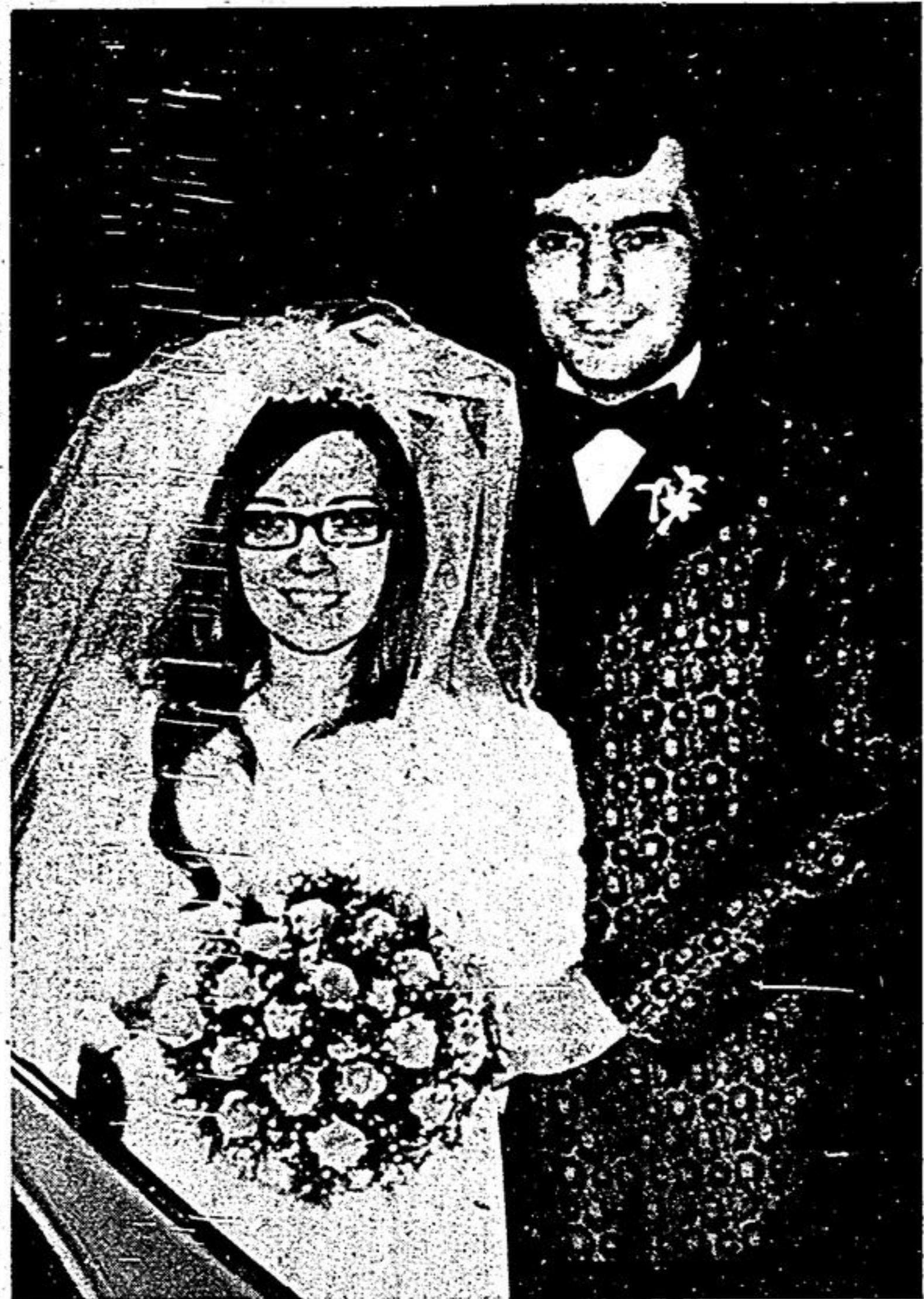

Late Harold Wood Many community interests

STOUFFVILLE - Service was held in the Stouffville Missionary Church, April 19, for the late Harold J. Wood, prominent realtor and village resident, following his sudden passing, April 17 in York County Hospital, Newmarket.

Mr. Wood, president of Harold Wood Real Estate Limited, had suffered a serious heart attack; six years ago, but recovered sufficiently to resume near-normal activities.

Mr. Wood was active in many areas of community life, and while never successful in winning a Council seat, he attended meetings regularly, particularly where planning matters were concerned. He served on the Stouffville Industrial Committee and took an interest in the Whitechurch - Stouffville Branch of the Progressive Conservative Party.

Harold Wood was born in Toronto. Following overseas duty with the Canadian Army during World War II, he operated a

grocery store, later moving to Stouffville in 1956.

Harold Wood was a cheerful man, always willing to spend a few minutes' time, talking to friends in his office, his home or on the street corner.

Surviving, besides his wife, the former Margaret Wideman, are two sons, Donald and Kenneth, both at home, and a brother,

Ernest, of Mississauga.

Mr. and Mrs. Wood recently celebrated their 25th wedding anniversary.

Rev. John Hamilton presided at the service with interment, Stouffville Cemetery. The pall bearers were Fred Alsop, Wm. Thompson, Ken May, Bob Paisley, Ronald Femson and Howard Ratcliff.
