Young bowlers rank with best in tournament

MARKHAM - Encouraged by an executive of enthusiastic parents, the Markham Youth Bowling League is graduating some talented boys and girls into competitive tournaments in other centres throughout the Province.

Two of these occurred April 15 and 16. The first, at the Sportsman's Bowlerama in Guelph, saw two teams entered in the 12 annual Canada Dry Bantam Bowling Championships. Thirty-eight Ontario cities and towns were represented, including 145 teams.

The girls, comprising Heather Harris, Cheryl Leckie, Leslie Smith, Sharon Cotter and Lynette Mills, did exceptionally well, placing 6th out of 72 teams and had a total pin-fall of 1,724.

The boys were 47th out of 72, with a total pin-fall of 1,517. Members were Kevin Furois, Billy Nutter, Jeff Richmond, Michael Unterman and George Lewis.

Eleven year old Heather Harris enjoyed excellent results, breaking the High Double record with a 523 score. She also chalked up the third highest single with a 267. It is only her second season in competitive bowling. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Harris of Unionville, are active bowlers with the Unionville Vets.

In a High Singles Tournament at North Bathurst Bowl, Markham had entries in the Bantam, Junior and Senior divisions. In the Pee wee section, Lori Ann Churchward placed second with a 434 triple. Lori Ann is 8. Billy Nutter of the Bantam boys placed second with a 634. Cheryl Leckie of the Bantam girls was 1st with a 635 triple and Marc Furois of the Junior boys, 1st with a 736 triple.
