DURHAM - Willis Galbraith, 72, of Egremont Township died Wednesday, April 26 in Victoria Hospital, London, after a brief illness.

Born April 25, 1900 near Ottawa, he was the eldest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Archibald Galbraith. In 1932 he married Mildred Schmidt in Saskatchewan. The couple farmed for many years near Ottawa, then resided in Stouffville for 17 years before retiring to the Durham area in 1965.

Horse auctions popular

STOUFFVILLE - One of the largest horse sales yet held at the Stouffville Sales Barn saw over 200 registered, and most of them sold.

The auction was held May 1 and attracted many knowledgeable buyers. Among the horses for sale was a prize stud, subject to a reserve of \$2,500. Although bidding for this animal went to \$2,000, the owner declined to sell.

A second sale was held simultaneously, when boats, trailers, and campers went on the auction block. Most of the 27 units presented were sold in short order.

While no date has been set for further sales of boats and trailers, two horse auctions will take place, May 22 and June 5.

Accept anti-airport petition

MARKHAM Council decided reluctantly to accept a petition concerning the airport, presented at a meeting Apr. 25.

Councillor Jim Jongeneel, acting Mayor in the absence of Tony Roman, observed that there were "a lot of signatures", but no addresses. The petition asked Council

to approach senior governments with a view to stopping the airport destined for a site in Pickering Township.

Councillor Norm Tyndall wanted nothing to do with the document.

"I feel we should receive petitions only when there are addresses and a witness

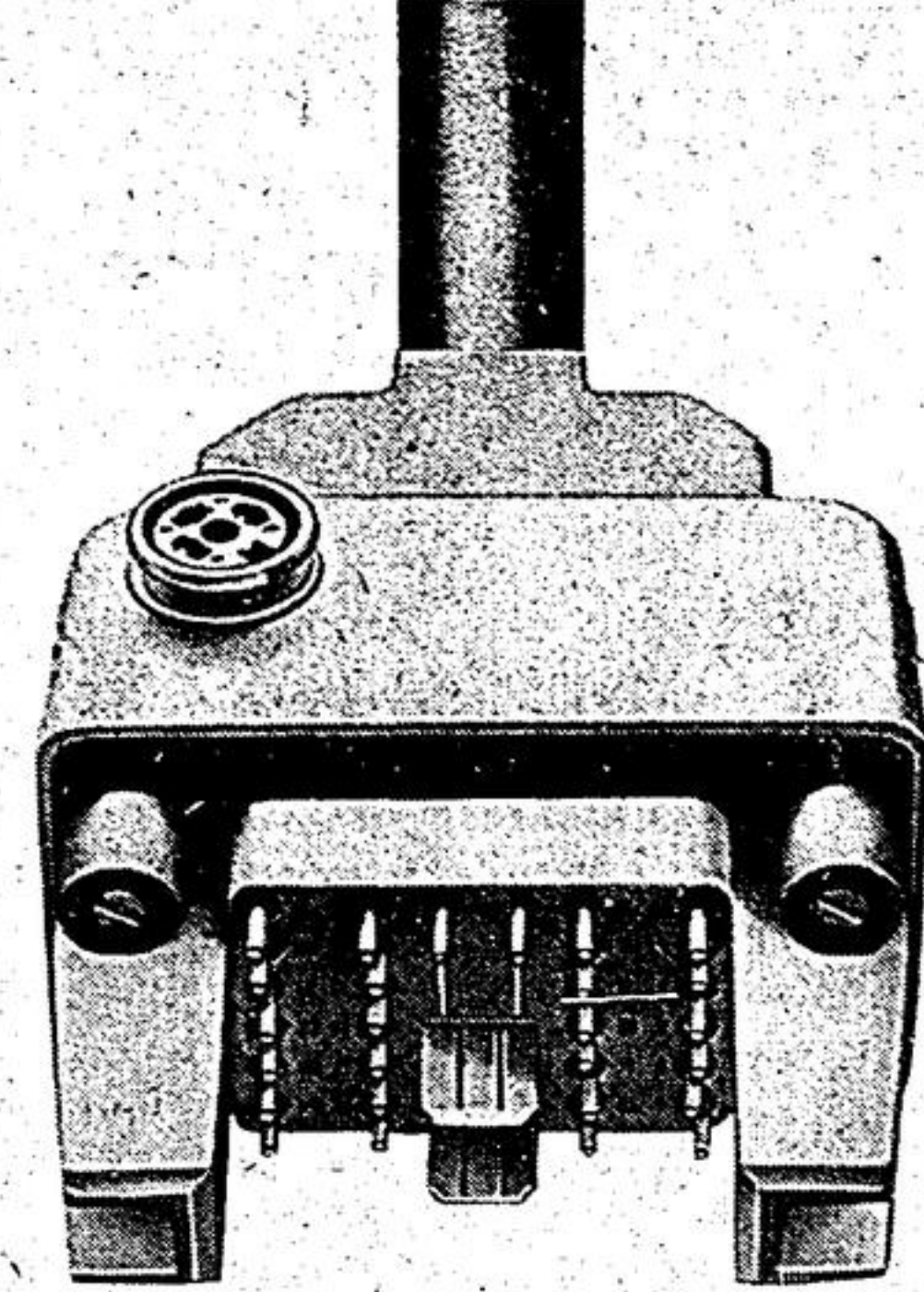
for each signature", he said, "I could sign my name 100 times, too".
