STOUFFVILLE The Minister's Order. which "froze" 30,000 acres of land in Whitchurch - Stouffville, may not be worth the paper it's written

This possibility emerged from a Planning Committee meeting May 5, when Bylaw Enforcement Officer Marshall Miller asked members for guidance. When the freeze was put on, to prevent building in noise lands from the Airport, no mechanism of enforcement was established.

"I'm wondering who is responsible for enforcing this Order," hMr. Miller asaid,
