Charlotte A. Baldwin

She loved children

GOODWOOD - On April 26, Mrs. Frederick Baldwin, the former Charlotte Angelina Couling, passed away at Lake View Manor, Beaverton, in her 81st year.
Mrs. Baldwin was born in Guelph, but moved West as a child, living in Brandon Manitoba, Hayfield and Manor, Saskatchewan. She was a school teacher and always a friend of little children. She was a firm believer in the Christian faith and it was her firm conviction that one should go to church in the community in which you lived. She was a member of Goodwood Baptist Church and as long as health permitted taught Sunday School.
In 1918, she married Frederick Baldwin of Ogema Saskatchewan. Because of drought and depression, the family came to Ontario in 1934. They were on various farms until they bought the Roach property on Sideline 5, Uxbridge Twp., later returning to Goodwood.
Mr. Baldwin predeceased her in 1962. Her son George died in 1969. She is survived by one daughter Kathleen (Mrs. Reuben May) of Goodwood and seven grandchildren, four great grandchildren, also two sisters Mrs. May Keown and Mrs. Annie McMurray, both of Rexdale.

Mrs. Baldwin rested at the W. Kent Milroy Funeral Home, Claremont. Funeral service was conducted by Rev. George Gorman in Goodwood Baptist church with interment, Goodwood Cemetery.

A multi-level swimming program for all ages from beginners to Red Cross life saving. Ten-hour packages from June 19 to August 25. Individuals will be divided into three groups; Learn to Swim, Junior, and Advanced, and the maximum number in each group is 10. There will also be a program of special interest to mothers and pre-schoolers. Fee: \$15.
