# "The Province couldn't care less about us"

STOUFFVILLE This conclusion Council members are reluctant to make a "snap" decision on York Region's Brief to the province, in connection with the Toronto Centred Region Plan.

major objection to the Brief, brought up by councillor Merlyn Baker, was a proposal to make the Committee of Adjustment a Regional body, rather than a local one.

Although Regional Council has adopted the Brief, local municipalities are still free to add their comments on any aspect of the submission. Council members saw the proposal for the Committee of Adjustment as a further erosion of local autonomy. "Within ten years there will be no such thing as a local municipality", predicted Chairman Tom Lonergan. "I see

no reason these matters should go to Newmarket". Mr. Welch admitted the local Committee of Adjustment has behaved responsibly, but added the same is not true in all municipalities. "The Region doesn't intend to take over responsibility for minor variances", he stated. "No matter what decisions we make, the power will be taken away from us", observed Mr. Lonergan. He cited the question of the Airport, which places a commercial use in a zone designated greenbelt by the TCRP. "The provincial government has lied to us", he charged. "They couldn't care less about us".

## Opposes petition — and airport

MARKHAM Norm Tyndall, Ward 6 Councillor, Town of Markham, went on record, recently, opposing a petition submitted by opponents of the proposed international airport in Pickering Twp.

Earlier, councillor Tyndall had indicated his support for the P.O.P. cause. He's now being accused of switching oars in mid-stream. Through The Tribune, Mr. Tyndall wishes it made clear he still opposes the airport project. However, he said, he could not accept a list of signatures with no addresses attached or accompanying witnesses as to their legitimacy.

adding the objection to transferring Committee of Adjustment powers. Mr. Welch said that Council's general support of the Brief would be "encouraging". He commended members for taking an interest in the submission, adding that some York Region municipalities have barely even considered it.

Time is a major factor, warned Mr. Welch. "It's imperative that this Brief be before the Minister (Darcy McKeough) before the end of this session", he said. It is his understanding, the planner said, that the province will be bringing in legislation early in the next session to give legal weight to the TCRP, and York Region wishes to be sure that its views will be considered.

"I think we should have more time to digest this report", observed Councillor Merlyn Baker. "How can we endorse something when we don't know what it says?" There was general agreement among members, the chairman pointing out that the Brief is a lengthy document. Mr. Welch again cited the difficulty with having a short time to lay the submission before the Cabinet, and revealed that the printing of this document is now in progress. He also issued a blunt warning. "McKeough has

given the responsibility for this to the Region", he said. "Frankly, he is not interested in having Briefs from individual local municipalities". After a discussion totalling an hour and a half, members agreed to consider the subject again at a future meeting.
