Saturday visitors with Mr. and Mrs. Roy Brillinger were Mr. and Mrs. Mel Heise of Scarborough.

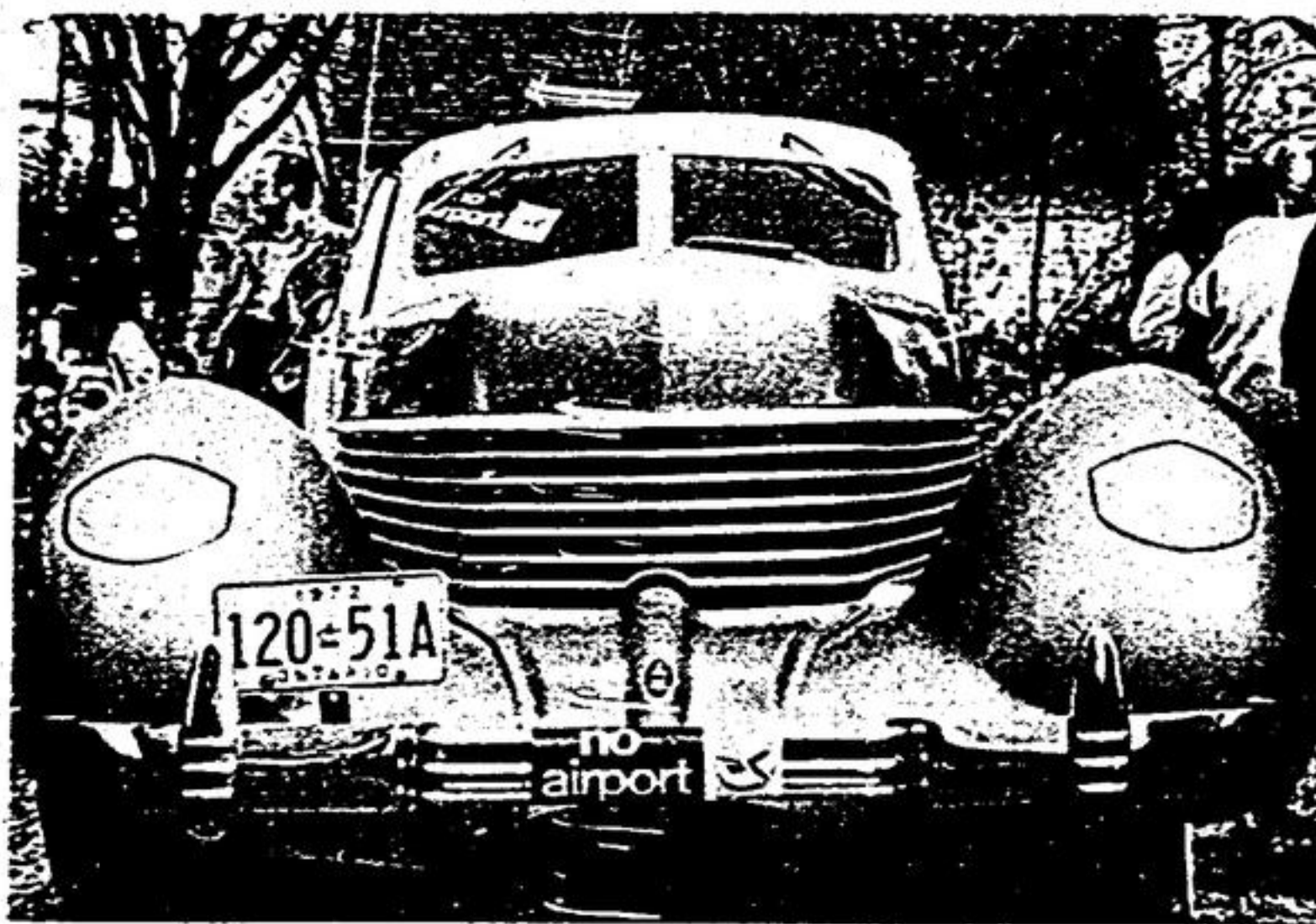

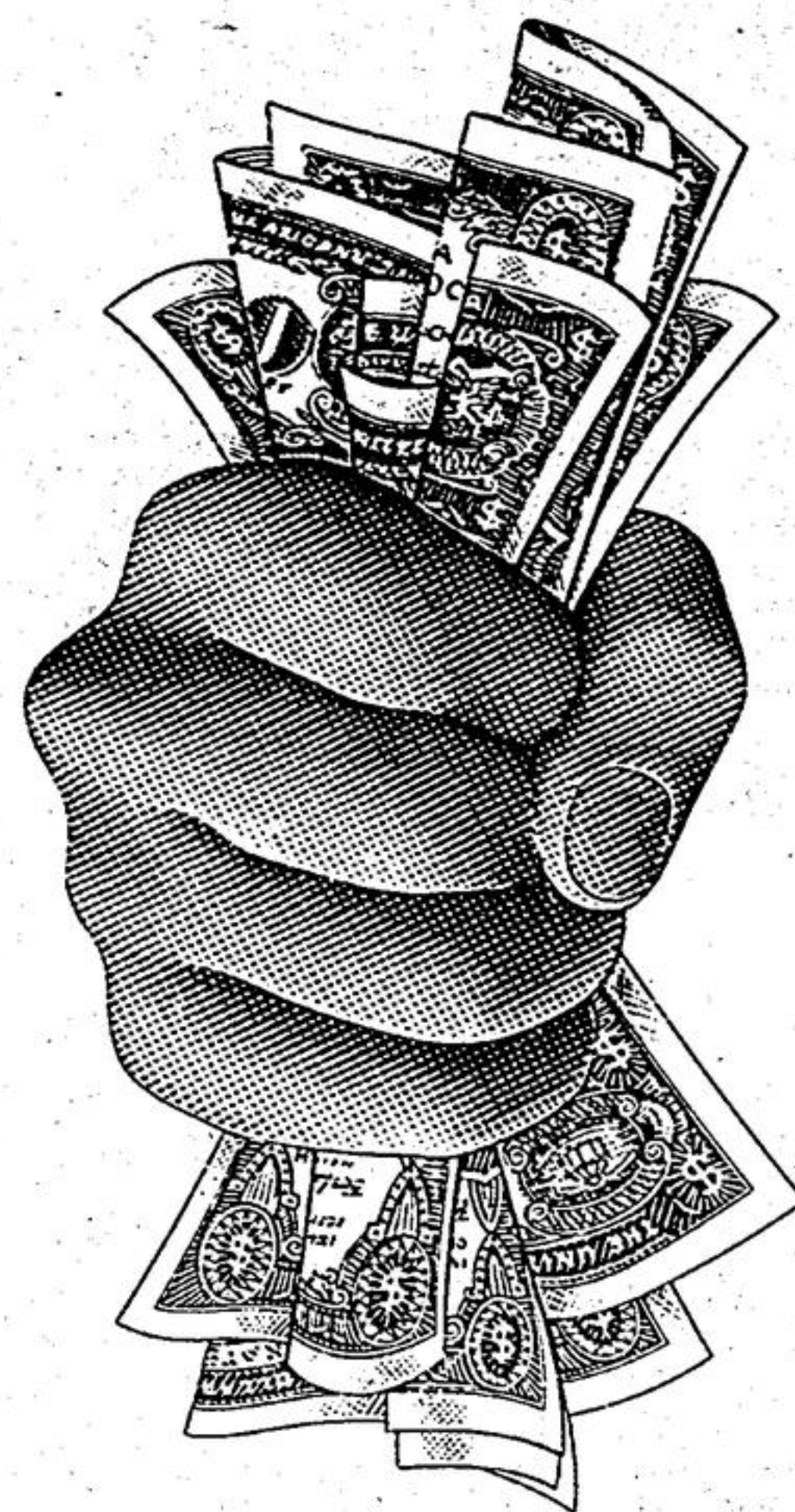

PICKERING - Apparently alarmed by anti-airport voices continuing to urge a more extensive use of Malton airport and an enlarging of that area, residents in the Malton area have met to protest any change in the government plans.

Spokesmen at the meeting claimed that much of the time Malton airport was in chaos because of overcrowding and further extensions could not be tolerated by the thousands of residents close by.
