STOUFFVILLE - June 10 was to have been a day that 11 year old Judy Sackfield of Ballantrae would long remember.

Instead, it turned out to be one she'd like to forget. With two red ribbons already won, and trying for an Intermediate girls' high jump record at the Stouffville Invitational Track and Field Meet, Saturday, Judy suffered a broken right arm.

Her father, on hand to see the event, took Judy to the Stouffville Medical Centre, and then to Scarboro Centenary Hospital, where the bone was reset. She was released, Sunday.

Judy, a member of the Scarboro Optimists Track and Field Club, was to have competed in six events at Etobicoke, this Saturday. All activity along this line is over for the season.

Mrs. William Sackfield, Judy's mother, termed it a freak accident. She said Judy was quite accustomed to landing on foam mats, the kind used at the Stouffville Meet.

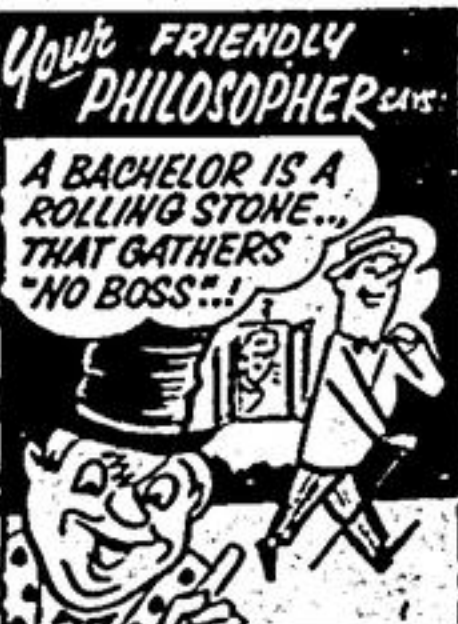

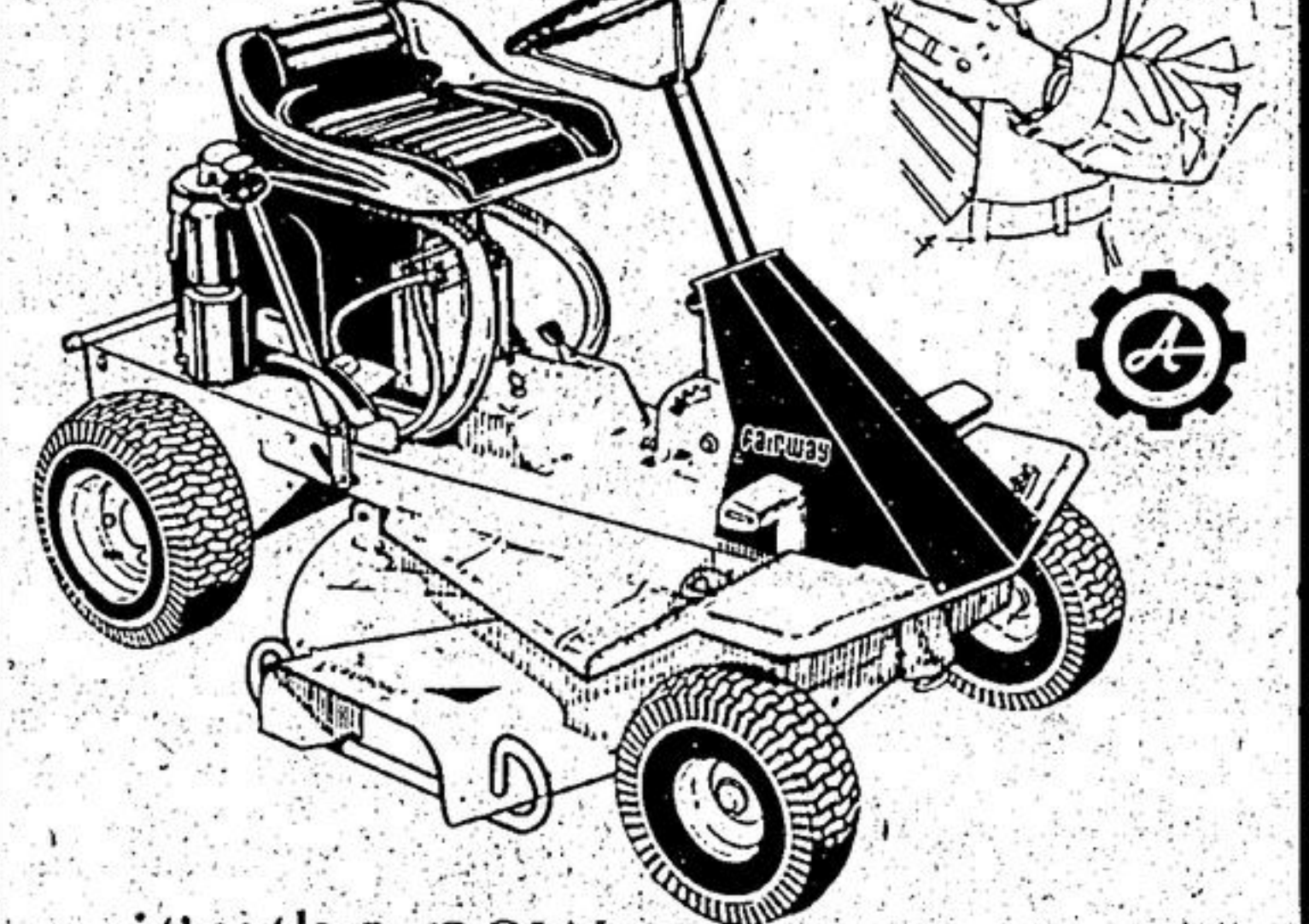
